13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

Reflecting national trends, the senior population is rapidly growing across Orange, Osceola, and Lake counties. An AARP survey revealed that 86% of adults aged 65 and older want to age in place, staying in their own homes. This underscores the need for accessible programs outside assisted living facilities to support health, well-being, and independence. Our goal is not an "adult daycare" but a vibrant hub of resources and support systems that empower active older adults to age in place and thrive.



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b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Seniors aged 65+ will benefit from programs supporting their physical, mental, and social well-being, including fitness classes, health consultations, and immunizations.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

A broad range of programs to support physical, mental, and social well-being, including fitness classes, cultural events, medical consultations, immunizations, preventive and rehabilitative care, annual health fairs, workshops on technology, financial planning, cognitive health, healthy cooking, and meaningful volunteer opportunities— all under one roof at the community center.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Adults aged 65 and older. The center aims to serve at least 100-200 seniors per month.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

This initiative will enhance seniors' physical health, mobility, and overall well-being while fostering intergenerational connections and a stronger sense of community. It will improve quality of life by addressing physical, mental, and emotional health needs and reducing social isolation through increased engagement, measured by surveys, attendance, and health assessments. Additionally, security enhancements will protect both visitors and the surrounding community by reducing vulnerabilities, increasing monitoring, and strengthening safety measures. Finally, the program will create new job and volunteer opportunities to support the growing senior population, tracked through staff and volunteer recruitment.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?

We do not see the need for consideration of additional penalties since we fully expect the project to be compliant with and acceptable outcome.
