a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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The Florida Senate Local Funding Initiative Request Fiscal Year 2025-2026

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The Florida Girls Initiative aims to inspire hope and empower girls by providing the education and resources needed to choose positive paths away from street life. It helps them avoid human trafficking and other dangers through a structured, evidence-based curriculum focusing on positive peer interactions, resiliency, problem-solving, decision-making, and trafficking awareness. FGI's goal is to empower girls to build safer, brighter futures.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Funding for the Florida Girls Initiative will support education, leadership development, mental health, and community engagement for "at-promise girls" in underserved communities. It will also facilitate research to identify service gaps and develop tailored, evidence-based programs that can be expanded statewide.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

FGI programs support "at-promise" girls ages 11-17 in avoiding high-risk behaviors like substance use, unsafe sex, and violence. By offering meaningful activities and skill-building experiences, the program empowers girls to make healthy choices and build successful future. Funding from the state appropriations request will expand these critical services for "at-promise girls" in underserved communities, with a focus on human trafficking prevention, trauma-informed care, academic support, and mental health services.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

FGI programs serve "at-promise" girls ages 11-17 who are at risk of engaging in high-risk behaviors such as substance use, unsafe sex, violence, and fall victim to human trafficking. The program prioritizes girls from underserved communities, those in or aging out of foster care, and those vulnerable to human trafficking. The initiative aims to reach and positively impact the lives of the 1.3 million at-promise girls in Florida, providing them with the resources, mentorship, and support needed to make healthy choices and build brighter futures.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The Florida Girls Initiative (FGI) aims to actively engage youth within their communities, schools, organizations, peer groups, and families in meaningful and constructive ways. FGI will measure its impact through intake and exit surveys, along with an independent evaluation conducted by Urban Markets and Analytics & the NGC Team, ensuring data-driven insights into the program's effectiveness.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?

To ensure program effectiveness and integrity, FGI will complete the Department of Juvenile Justice's Corrective Action Plan and implement key accountability measures. Payments will be disbursed in phases, with funding withheld until deliverables and key performance indicators (KPIs) are met. Performance-based reductions will apply if goals or milestones are not achieved, impacting future funding. Additionally, contractors failing to fulfill deliverables must repay or reimburse funds as required.
