This project will be divided into 2 phases. The city is requesting \$500,000 with a city match of \$250,000 to fund phase 1 of the design

and engineering. Phase 2 would be the facility buildout.



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The funds requested will be utilized for the construction of a Regional Public Safety Multi-Purpose Complex and Emergency Operations Center. This specialized facility will enhance public safety by serving as a comprehensive training hub for first responders, law enforcement, and various local, regional, and international agencies. It will also provide community risk reduction and public safety education programs for residents, fostering greater preparedness and awareness. Additionally, the Emergency Operations Center will enable the City's administrative staff, Fire Rescue, Police Department, and Code Enforcement to operate collaboratively in a unified space, ensuring coordinated and efficient response efforts during disasters such as hurricanes and other large-scale emergencies. As funding for this project is not available through state or federal grants, the requested funds are essential to bringing this critical initiative to fruition.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The activities and services provided through the use of these funds will include: Training and Development: Establishing a dedicated hub for comprehensive training programs for first responders, law enforcement, and various local, regional, and international agencies to enhance preparedness and operational effectiveness. Community Risk Reduction and Education: Offering programs designed to educate residents on public safety and disaster preparedness, fostering a safer and more resilient community. Emergency Operations Coordination: Creating a state-of-the-art Emergency Operations Center where the City's administrative staff, Fire Rescue, Police Department, and Code Enforcement can collaborate in a unified space to plan, manage, and execute coordinated response efforts during hurricanes and other large-scale emergencies. These activities and services collectively contribute to enhancing public safety, improving emergency response capabilities, and safety to the city and Broward County.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The appropriation project will provide the following direct services to citizens: Public Safety Education and Awareness Programs: Residents will benefit from educational initiatives aimed at reducing risks and improving public safety awareness, helping them better prepare for emergencies and disasters. Enhanced Emergency Response: The centralized Emergency Operations Center will enable efficient coordination among City administrative staff, Fire Rescue, Police Department, and Code Enforcement, ensuring faster and more effective responses to disasters such as hurricanes and other large-scale emergencies. Community Risk Reduction Services: Proactive risk reduction measures, such as safety inspections, hazard mitigation, and preparedness training, will directly enhance the safety and well-being of citizens. Improved First Responder Training: The goal is to strengthen public safety, reduce risks, and ensure a more resilient and well-prepared community.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population served by this project includes: Residents of North Lauderdale: Over 47,000 citizens will benefit directly from improved public safety education, community risk reduction programs, and enhanced emergency response capabilities. First Responders and Law Enforcement Agencies: Local, regional, and international agencies will utilize the facility as a training hub, enhancing their preparedness and effectiveness in serving their respective communities. City Administrative Staff: Key departments, including Fire Rescue, Police, and Code Enforcement, will leverage the centralized Emergency Operations Center for coordinated disaster response and city-wide emergency management. Overall, the project is expected to serve the entire population of North Lauderdale, alongside numerous first responders and law enforcement professionals from various jurisdictions. The impact will extend to thousands of additional individuals in surrounding areas through improved regional safety.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Expected Benefits/Outcomes: Enhanced Public Safety, Improved Training for First Responders and increased Community Preparedness: The facility will improve the efficiency and effectiveness of emergency response efforts during disasters and large-scale emergencies, reducing harm to residents and property. The centralized Emergency Operations Center will enable city departments to collaborate effectively, ensuring a unified response during critical incidents. The methodology for measuring outcomes is by tracking improvements in emergency response times for Fire Rescue, Police, and other services during disasters. Additional areas to measure outcomes are through: Training Participation and Effectiveness, Community Engagement, Disaster Response Performance, and Resident Satisfaction Surveys. By tracking these metrics, the project's impact on public safety and community resilience can be effectively measured and continuously improved.
