The funds will expand access to wilderness education, community gardening, nutrition programs, and workforce training for at-risk youth and economically disadvantaged communities. This initiative aims to enhance food security, promote environmental stewardship, improve physical and mental well-being, and create sustainable job opportunities in agriculture and related fields. By fostering self-sufficiency and resilience, the project will equip participants with essential life skills while addressing systemic disparities in health, education, and economic mobility.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The project targets at-risk youth, economically disadvantaged individuals, jobless persons, the homeless, and those facing physical and mental health challenges. It also supports grade school, high school, and college students, as well as individuals impacted by the justice system. By providing essential resources and training, the initiative aims to uplift vulnerable populations and create pathways to self-sufficiency. The program is expected to serve between 401 and 800 individuals, offering direct support through education, job training, and wellness programs.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will

be measured?

This project will enhance food security, improve health outcomes, create job opportunities, and promote environmental stewardship. Success will be measured by increased access to fresh food, participation in nutrition and wellness programs, job placements in agriculture and sustainability, and environmental impact through garden expansions and community clean-ups. Metrics include participant engagement, pre- and post-program assessments, employment rates, and sustainability initiatives tracked through reports, surveys, and attendance records.
