a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The requested funds will help establish the 4Roots Phytonutrient Lab, advancing Florida's agricultural industry by researching nutrient-rich crops, improving soil health, and supporting sustainable farming. This lab will provide farmers with training, develop innovative agricultural solutions, and drive economic growth through agritourism and job creation, positioning Florida as a leader in phytonutrient research and agriculture innovation.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?



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Support the development of the Lab, advancing agricultural research to enhance the nutritional quality of crops. Activities include analyzing soil and plant samples, developing nutrient-dense crop varieties, and researching sustainable farming practices. The lab will drive economic growth by supporting local farmers, attracting agricultural tourism, and positioning Florida as a leader in agriculture innovation.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Support Florida's agricultural industry by developing nutrient-rich crops, improving soil health, soil analysis for farmers and providing research-backed solutions for farming. Additionally, farmer trainings, agriculture education and access to healthier food. The Lab will drive economic development and tourism, positioning Florida as a leader in agriculture innovation as one of the few labs in the US dedicated to these services.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The 4Roots Phytonutrient Lab will serve farmers, medical professionals, culinary experts, students, and the community, enhancing Florida's agricultural and health industries. It will provide farmers with training on soil health and nutrient-rich crops, educate medical students and physicians on food-as-medicine, train culinary professionals in sustainable practices, and students will engage in STEM-based learning. The 4Roots Farm Campus will attract 300,000 visitors annually, boosting agritourism and economic growth.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The Phytonutrient Lab will advance Florida's agricultural industry by developing nutrient-rich crops, improving soil health, and providing research-backed solutions for sustainable farming. It will support farmers with training, enhance food quality, and drive economic growth through agritourism and job creation. Outcomes will be measured through soil and crop analyses, farmer training participation, economic impact reports, visitor data, and community health metrics, ensuring tangible benefits for Florida's economy, environment, and public health.
