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13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The Immokalee Foundation (TIF) provides a proven career pathway for students in Immokalee to become SW Florida's workforce in high-demand careers focusing on Engineering & Construction Management, Business Management & Entrepreneurship, Education & Human Services, and Health Care. Career exploration begins in middle school, and TIF guidance and support continue to employment, including career education, internships, tutoring, mentors, academic advisors, career counseling, and mental wellness services.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Our services provide after-school and summer programming for students to explore in-demand career fields in Southwest Florida. Elements include career counseling, certification attainment, internships before high school graduation, career action plans, and exposure field trips. Summer camps, in partnership with postsecondary institutions, offer expert instruction and exposure field trips.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Funding will enable students in Immokalee to explore in-demand fields and postsecondary options beyond their rural setting. Services include one-on-one career advising, paid internships in their areas of interest, hands-on learning experiences, and transportation to career activities. These initiatives will equip students with the skills and knowledge needed to build a strong regional workforce.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The Immokalee Foundation serves a projected 1,300 students annually and has served 16,726 students since 1991. The students we serve are economically disadvantaged, at-risk elementary students, middle and high school youth, and postsecondary students. 100% of these children and youth live in Immokalee, a REDI & RAO community.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Growing Florida's economy by increasing the number of workforce-ready professionals. A recent study at the Tampa Bay region shows \$1 billion in economic gains if college enrollment increased by 10%.

100% of The Immokalee Foundation students graduate from high school and enter a college program, get a job in their career field or enter the military. 93% of the Foundation's postsecondary students complete their degrees with 89% earning a bachelor degree or higher and 87% working in their field of study, thus a state-wide model for building a skilled workforce and growing and expanding Florida's economy.

The Immokalee Foundation measures outcomes including graduation rates, grades, attendance, and participation. Students meet with Advisors to review their metrics regularly. Metrics are also presented to our Board of Directors annually. The most impactful metric is 87% of our postsecondary graduates are working in their career field and contributing to Florida's economy.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?

If mid-year and annual metrics are not met and no acceptable remediation plan is not in place, no further state funds will be awarded.

Metrics will include:

- 100% on time graduation rate and enrollment in postsecondary program, work in their career field or enter the armed forces with in 6 months.
- 100% of eight grade students will enter high school with a Career Action Plan to guide their high school and postsecondary studies and extracurricular activities to ensure their job success.
- 75% of postsecondary program graduates will earn a bachelor degree or higher.
