The FSU College of Law Election Law Center provides objective, non-partisan, evidence-based analysis of election-related laws, policies, and constitutional issues. It sponsors conferences, lectures, and courses, and assists policymakers and election officials. The center has also provided scholarships and fellowship opportunities for law students seeking to pursue careers in election law, working with the Department of State, FL Elections Commission, and Supervisors of Election. It prepares research including articles, testimony, and publicly accessible websites to disseminate its research, enhance transparency, and increase public confidence in Florida elections.

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The funding will be used to establish and maintain the nonpartisan FSU College of Law Election Law Center to develop objective, evidence-based analysis of election-related legal, constitutional, regulatory, and policy issues.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The Center will hold conferences, workshops, and lectures for law students, practitioners, and the public, as well as educational presentations for election officials. It will conduct research and generate reports and articles on election law issues for use by scholars, election officials, practitioners, and lawmakers. It will provide direct practical assistance to lawmakers and election administrators, as well as scholarships and fellowship opportunities for law students seeking to specialize in the field.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The Center will hold conferences and lectures open to the public, sponsor and create websites such as the Florida Post-Election Audit which are accessible to the public, and publicly disseminate articles and other research prepared by the Center to promote transparency and bolster public confidence in Florida's electoral system.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The Election Law Center will serve students, election officials, legislators, scholars, and voters. Each year, dozens of students at FSU College of Law are likely to participate in its various programs, along with hundreds of attorneys (getting CLE through Center programs) and other members of the public attending conferences, lectures, and other events. Thousands of people visit the Center's webpage and online projects the Center co-sponsors.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will

be measured?

The Election Law Center will track the number of students who take affiliated courses and participate in its programs; the number of articles, reports, and other materials the center generates; attendance at the Center's conferences, lectures, and other events; guotes in the media; and opportunities to make educational presentations to, or otherwise assist, government officials. The Center will also rely on feedback from legislators, election administrators, and other officials.
