ONH focuses on teaching self-sufficiency and life skills to our clients through our various programs and services. From identifying opportunities for employment to providing mental health counseling, we help our clients develop positive relationships and better manage their finances and lives. Our programs prevent crime, reduce recidivism and directly connect people to workforce training programs that focus on the introduction of new technologies, updated service standards/procedures, workplace literacy, and upskilling workers to meet the demands of ever evolving industries.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Funding from this request will allow ONH to serve over 5,000 people over the next year through our various programs. Clients will be identified pre- and post-release to receive our reentry services and will be assessed to create individualized plans of care and industry specific training, receive holistic support for a full year, and be placed in living wage employment with opportunities for advancement. We provide training in relevant career- pathway skills to meet the needs of modern industry. We deliver wrap-around services that support long-term success and build self-sufficiency.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Implementing a comprehensive approach (case management, mental health therapy, supportive services, job training, and job placement assistance), Our programs ensure each client succeeds. Each client is paired with a Licensed Mental Health Counselor, Case Manager, and Job Coach who provide support for a full year tailored to meet individual needs and goals. Participants are required to remain drug-free and attend 3 weeks of a comprehensive Career Development training program featuring life skills, employment readiness, financial literacy, and a technology bootcamp. Career Development focuses on interpersonal skills, self-sufficiency, coping strategies, communication, employability, and job retention. Clients also receive support with vocational training, housing and help with resources like clothing, food and vital documents.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Returning Citizens, Justice Affected Citizens, At Risk Individuals, Former Inmates, People Struggle with Substance Abuse

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

People affected by the justice system or at risk face a multitude of barriers including lack of housing, transportation, job skills training, and employment opportunities. Without adequate housing, transportation, and employment, people are less connected to their communities and therefore, far more likely to commit crime or re-offend. By focusing on prevention, diversion, and intervention, ONH helps to reduce disciplinary and criminal justice involvement and provides individuals and families with tools for long-term success. Education, Case Management and Employment Opportunities reduce recidivism, corrections costs and reduce unemployment rates. Investing in prevention programs creates tax paying citizens, hence increasing tax revenues (income and sales).

Long term penalizes such as inability to apply for future state project funding and claw back provisions would be considered.
