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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Section 828.30, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

828.30 Rabies vaccination of dogs and cats.--

- (1) All dogs and cats 4 months of age or older must be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian against rabies with a United States Government-approved vaccine. The cost of vaccination must be borne by the animal's owner.
- (2) A dog or cat is exempt from vaccination against rabies if a licensed veterinarian has examined the animal and has certified in writing that at the time vaccination would endanger the animal's health because of its age, infirmity, disability, illness, or other medical considerations. An exempt animal must be vaccinated against rabies as soon as its health permits.
- (3) Upon vaccination against rabies, the licensed veterinarian shall provide the animal's owner and the animal control authority with a rabies vaccination certificate which must contain at least the following information:

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- (a) The license number of the administering veterinarian.
  - (b) The name, address, and phone number of the veterinarian and owner.
    - (c) The date of vaccination.
    - The expiration date of the vaccination.
  - The species, age, sex, color, breed, weight, and (e) name of the animal vaccinated.
    - The rabies vaccine manufacturer. (f)
    - (q) The vaccine lot number and expiration date.
    - The type and brand of vaccine used. (h)
    - The route of administration of the vaccine. (i)
  - The signature or signature stamp of the licensed ( j ) veterinarian.
- (4) Except as provided in this subsection, the name, address, and telephone number of the animal owner which are set forth in the rabies vaccination certificate provided to the animal control authority are confidential and exempt from s. 119.07(1) and s. 24(a), Art. I of the State Constitution. Such confidential and exempt information may be given to other public agencies as needed. The receiving agencies must maintain the confidentiality of the information. However, a state or local governmental agency may provide the confidential and exempt rabies vaccination certificate information to any person for inspection at the animal control authority, but only in nonelectronic form, only the information from one rabies vaccination certificate at a time, and only if the person makes the request using the name or address of the animal owner. The agency shall make the information available for statistical analysis or research 31 purposes to a bona fide news reporting organization or

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30 31 academic institution. The information may not be sold or resold for commercial purposes. This subsection is subject to the Open Government Sunset Review Act of 1995 in accordance with s. 119.15, and shall stand repealed on October 2, 2003, unless reviewed and saved from repeal through reenactment by the Legislature.

(5)(4) Violation of this section is a civil infraction, punishable as provided in s. 828.27(2).

 $\underline{(6)}(5)$  This section does not prohibit or limit municipalities or counties from enacting requirements similar to or more stringent than the provisions of this section for the implementation and enforcement of rabies-control ordinances.

Section 2. The Legislature finds that there is a public necessity to compile information contained in rabies vaccination certificates and to readily provide such information when necessary to promote public health, safety, and welfare. However, the Legislature also finds that such information is both confidential to the pet owner and proprietary for the veterinarian and should be distributed only when the public health, safety, and welfare demand. Rabies vaccination certificates include personal information about individual pet owners which, when compiled, can be used to produce the client list of each veterinarian who has complied with the provisions of section 828.30, Florida Statutes, which requires the filing of a copy of rabies vaccination certificates with the local animal control authority. Such lists are trade secrets as defined by section 812.081, Florida Statutes. The Legislature finds that it is a public necessity that trade secret information be expressly made confidential and exempt from public records law because

it is a felony to disclose such records. Thus, the public and private harm in disclosing trade secrets significantly 2 3 outweighs any public benefit derived from disclosure, and the public's ability to scrutinize and monitor agency action is 4 5 not diminished by nondisclosure of trade secrets. Generally, 6 the release of such information for reasons outside the scope 7 of public health, safety, and welfare unnecessarily 8 jeopardizes the right to privacy of pet owners who have their pets vaccinated and, further, negatively affects veterinarians 9 10 who submit rabies vaccination certificates by making the 11 identities of their clients readily available to competing business interests. Furthermore, veterinarians are subject to 12 medical confidentiality provisions. Release of identifying 13 information in the rabies vaccination certificate for reasons 14 other than the protection of public health, safety, and 15 welfare could represent a breach of client confidentiality. 16 17 In addition, release of the information contained in a rabies vaccination certificate could subject pet owners to possible 18 19 theft or harassment by individuals who target particular breeds, as well as to solicitations, including solicitations 20 from competing veterinary business interests. Owners could 21 become reluctant to have their pets vaccinated against rabies. 22 Any decrease in the number of dogs and cats vaccinated against 23 24 rabies would hinder the ability of animal control authorities to protect the public against the spread of rabies and 25 endanger the public health, safety, and welfare. 26 27 Section 3. This act shall take effect October 1, 1998. 28 29 30 31
