A bill to be entitled

An act relating to emergency medical services; amending ss. 365.171, 395.1027, F.S.; requiring a local governmental entity that operates a "911" emergency telephone system to enter into an agreement with the regional poison control center; requiring that the agreement outline a protocol under which the poison control center is consulted with respect to each emergency call that involves exposure to a potentially toxic substance; requiring the poison control center to assess the emergency and recommend an appropriate response; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

- Section 1. Subsections (4) and (6) of section 365.171, Florida Statutes, 1996 Supplement, are amended to read:
 - 365.171 Emergency telephone number "911."--
- (4) STATE PLAN.--The division shall develop a statewide emergency telephone number "911" system plan. The plan shall provide for:
- (a) The establishment of the public agency emergency telephone communications requirements for each entity of local government in the state.
- (b) A system to meet specific local government requirements. Such system <u>must</u> <u>shall</u> include law enforcement, firefighting, <u>poison control</u>, and emergency medical services and may include other emergency services such as <u>poison</u>

control, suicide prevention, and emergency management services.

- (c) Identification of the mutual aid agreements necessary to obtain an effective "911" system.
- (d) A funding provision $\underline{\text{that must}}$ which shall identify the cost necessary to implement the "911" system.
- (e) A firm implementation schedule that must which shall include the installation of the "911" system in a local community within 24 months after the designated agency of the local government gives a firm order to the telephone utility for a "911" system.

The division shall be responsible for the implementation and coordination of such plan. The division shall adopt any necessary rules and schedules related to public agencies for implementing and coordinating such plan, pursuant to chapter 120. The public agency designated in the plan shall order such system within 6 months after publication date of the plan if the public agency is in receipt of funds appropriated by the Legislature for the implementation and maintenance of the "911" system. Any jurisdiction which has utilized local funding as of July 1, 1976, to begin the implementation of the state plan as set forth in this section shall be eligible for at least a partial reimbursement of its direct cost when, and if, state funds are available for such reimbursement.

- (6) REGIONAL SYSTEMS. --
- (a) Nothing in This section does not shall be construed to prohibit or discourage the formation of multijurisdictional or regional systems; and any system established pursuant to this section may include the

jurisdiction, or any portion thereof, of more than one public agency.

(b) Each local governmental entity that operates a "911" system shall enter into a cooperative agreement with the poison control center established under s. 395.1027 which covers the geographic area of the "911" system. The cooperative agreement must outline a protocol under which the poison control center is consulted via a telephone conference call for each call to the "911" system that involves exposure to a potentially toxic substance. The regional poison control center shall assess the individual case and recommend the appropriate level of care so that an emergency unit is not unnecessarily dispatched or made unavailable for a more life-threatening intervention.

Section 2. Subsection (2) of section 395.1027, Florida Statutes, is amended, and subsection (4) is added to that section, to read:

395.1027 Regional poison control centers.--

- (2) Each regional poison control center shall provide the following services:
- (a) Toll-free access by the public for poison information.
 - (b) Case management of poison cases.
- (c) Professional consultation to health care practitioners and emergency "911" systems.
 - (d) Prevention education to the public.
 - (e) Data collection and reporting.
- (4) Each regional poison control center shall enter

 into a cooperative agreement with the local governmental

 entities that operate a "911" emergency telephone system

 within the center's geographic area. The cooperative agreement

must outline a protocol under which the poison control center is consulted via a telephone conference call for each call to the "911" system that involves exposure to a potentially toxic substance. The regional poison control center shall assess the individual case and recommend the appropriate level of care so that an emergency unit is not unnecessarily dispatched or made unavailable for a more life-threatening intervention.

Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 1997.

SENATE SUMMARY

Requires local governments that operate a "911" emergency telephone system and each regional poison control center to enter into cooperative agreements under which any emergency call that involves exposure to a potentially toxic substance is assessed by the poison control center. Provides for the poison control center to recommend the appropriate level of care in order to avoid unnecessarily dispatching an emergency unit.
