### I. Summary:

This bill creates a committee to review and make recommendations regarding funding requests for fairs, agricultural centers, pavilions, and multi-use facilities; prescribes criteria for reviews; provides for committee review of projects appropriated funds but not yet reviewed by the committee; and provides that the committee may recommend that funding for projects not previously reviewed that do not meet the criteria be placed in reserve.

This bill is to take effect upon becoming law.

# II. Present Situation:

In the past, requests for funding of agricultural fairs and facilities were submitted directly to the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, which would then submit each project in the department's yearly budget request as grants and aids to local governments and nonprofit organizations. The legislature would then determine which projects to fund from General Revenue. However, in the FY 1997-98 Appropriations Act (97-152, L.O.F), the legislature funded these projects as a group in several lump sums, and directed that a committee be established to determine how much each project should receive.

The Appropriations Act further stated that the committee will consist of the following: three members appointed by the Commissioner of Agriculture, two members appointed by the President of the Senate, two members appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and three members appointed by the Governor. The Florida Farm Bureau, the fruit and vegetable industry and the private marketing sector, among others should be considered in the appointment of the members.

The Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services estimates that approximately 20-30 projects apply for funding each year. Generally the funding requested is for facilities repair, improvement, land acquisition, or construction.

# III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

Section 1: Creates a committee to review funding requests for fairs, agricultural centers, pavilions, and multi-use facilities. The Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives are each to appoint two members of the committee by August 15, 1998, and the seventh member is to be chosen by the other appointees by September 15, 1998. Each appointee is to serve a 2-year term, and the committee is to designate a chairperson.

The committee's duties are to annually review all funding requests for fairs, agricultural centers, pavilions, and multi-use facilities submitted for the ensuing fiscal year. The committee is to prioritize each request and make recommendations to the Governor and the Legislature by February 1 preceding the fiscal year for which the funding is requested. In making its recommendations, the committee is to consider the following criteria: the extent of local government sponsorship and support for each project, whether the project will provide direct public educational and recreational benefits, and whether the project preserves history, culture, or heritage.

The committee is also to annually review fairs, agricultural centers, pavilions, and multi-use facilities that have previously been appropriated funds but were not previously reviewed by the committee. If the committee finds that the project meets the criteria, it is to recommend to the appropriate agency that a grant be awarded for the project up to the amount appropriated by the legislature. If the committee finds that the criteria are not met, it is to recommend that the Executive Office of the Governor place the appropriation for the project in reserve. Funds for projects reviewed in this manner must either be awarded or placed in reserve by January 1 of the fiscal year for which the funds were appropriated.

Section 2: Provides that this bill will take effect upon becoming a law.

Although this committee is not specifically housed in any department on the face of the bill, the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services has estimated the fiscal impact of this bill as follows:
