# I. <u>SUMMARY</u>:

This bill amends the boundaries of the Cedar Key Special Water and Sewerage District.

According to the Economic Impact Statement, certain property owners are subjected to an ad valorem tax imposed by the District for which they receive no benefit or services from the District. Redesignation of the District boundaries will assist the District in better meeting a wider percentage of users within the District area. It will also cause the District to lose approximately \$3,232.00 in ad valorem taxes, and decrease District boundaries by approximately 16,000 acres.

# II. SUBSTANTIVE RESEARCH:

#### A. PRESENT SITUATION:

The Cedar Key Special Water and Sewerage District (District) is an independent special district created by special act chapter 63-1569, Laws of Florida, as a public body corporate and political subdivision in Levy County. It is governed by three commissioners (Board) who serve staggered terms and are appointed by the Governor. The District, through its Board, has all of the powers of a public body corporate and political subdivision, including the authority to levy ad valorem taxes, and issue bonds.

Currently, certain property owners are subjected to an ad valorem tax imposed by the District for which they receive no benefit or services from the District.

Existing District boundaries encompass approximately 27,420 acres.

B. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

Redesignation of the District boundaries will assist the District in meeting a wider percentage of users within the District area. It will also cause the District to lose approximately \$3,232.00 in ad valorem taxes.

The bill will decrease District boundaries by approximately 16,000 acres.
