Subsection (2) of section 229.808, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 12 13 229.808 Annual nonpublic school survey .--(2) For the purpose of organizing, maintaining, and 14 15 updating this database, each nonpublic school shall annually execute and file a database survey form on a date designated 16 17 by the Department of Education which shall include a notarized statement ascertaining that the owner of the nonpublic school 18 19 has complied with the provisions of subsection (3). For the purpose of this section, "owner" means any individual who is 20 the chief administrative officer of a nonpublic school. HOUSE SUMMARY With respect to school attendance: clarifies definition of the term "home education program"; provides that nonpublic school survey requirements and certain attendance reporting requirements do not apply to home education programs; clarifies provisions relating to state or school district control of home education meet regular school attendance requirements; and revises certain requirements relating to home education programs. **CODING:**Words stricken are deletions; words underlined are additions.
