13	costs; providing an effective date.
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15	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
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17	Section 1. Subsection (1) of section 229.551, Florida
18	Statutes, is amended to read:
19	229.551 Educational management
20	(1) The department is directed to identify all
21	functions which under the provisions of this act contribute
22	to, or comprise a part of, the state system of educational
23	accountability and to establish within the department the
24	necessary organizational structure, policies, and procedures
25	for effectively coordinating such functions. Such policies
26	and procedures shall clearly fix and delineate
27	responsibilities for various aspects of the system and for
28	overall coordination of the total system. The commissioner
29	shall perform the following duties and functions:
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1	(a) Coordination of department plans for meeting
2	educational needs and for improving the quality of education
3	provided by the state system of public education;
4	(b) Coordination of management information system
5	development for all levels of education and for all divisions
6	of the department, to include the development and utilization
7	of cooperative education computing networks for the state
8	system of public education;
9	(c) Development of database definitions and all other
10	items necessary for full implementation of a comprehensive
11	management information system as required by s. 229.555;
12	(d) Coordination of all planning functions for all
13	levels and divisions within the department;
14	(e) Coordination of all cost accounting and cost
15	reporting activities for all levels of education, including
16	public schools, vocational programs, community colleges, and
17	institutions in the State University System;
18	(f) Development and coordination of a common course
19	designation and numbering system for postsecondary education
20	in school districts, community colleges, participating
21	nonpublic postsecondary education institutions, and the State
22	University System which will improve program planning,
23	increase communication among all postsecondary delivery
24	systems community colleges and universities, and facilitate
25	the transfer of students. The system shall not encourage or
26	require course content prescription or standardization or
27	uniform course testing, and the continuing maintenance of the
28	system shall be accomplished by appropriate faculty committees
29	representing public and participating nonpublic institutions.
30	Also, the system shall be applied to all postsecondary and
31	certificate career education programs and courses offered in
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1 school districts and community colleges. The Articulation
2 Coordinating Committee, whose membership represents public and
3 nonpublic postsecondary institutions, shall:

4 1. Identify the highest demand degree programs within5 the State University System.

6 2. Conduct a study of courses offered by universities
7 and accepted for credit toward a degree. The study shall
8 identify courses designated as either general education or
9 required as a prerequisite for a degree. The study shall also
10 identify these courses as upper-division level or
11 lower-division level.

3. Appoint faculty committees representing both 12 13 community college and university faculties to recommend a single level for each course included in the common course 14 15 numbering and designation system. Any course designated as an upper-division level course must be characterized by a need 16 17 for advanced academic preparation and skills that a student 18 would be unlikely to achieve without significant prior 19 coursework. A course that is offered as part of an associate 20 in science degree program and as an upper-division course for 21 a baccalaureate degree shall be designated for both the lower and upper division. Of the courses required for each 22 baccalaureate degree, at least half of the credit hours 23 24 required for the degree shall be achievable through courses designated as lower-division courses, except in degree 25 programs approved by the Board of Regents pursuant to s. 26 27 240.209(5)(e). A course designated as lower-division may be 28 offered by any community college. By January 1, 1996, The 29 Articulation Coordinating Committee shall recommend to the 30 State Board of Education the levels for the courses. By 31 January 1, 1996, The common course numbering and designation

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system shall include the courses at the recommended levels,
 and by fall semester of 1996, the registration process at each
 state university and community college shall include the
 courses at their designated levels and common course numbers.

5 4. Appoint faculty committees representing both 6 community college and university faculties to recommend those 7 courses identified to meet general education requirements 8 within the subject areas of communication, mathematics, social sciences, humanities, and natural sciences. By January 1, 9 10 1996, The Articulation Coordinating Committee shall recommend 11 to the State Board of Education those courses identified to meet these general education requirements by their common 12 13 course code number. By fall semester, 1996, All community 14 colleges and state universities shall accept these general education courses. 15

Appoint faculty committees representing both 16 5. 17 community colleges and universities to recommend common 18 prerequisite courses and identify course substitutions when 19 common prerequisites cannot be established for degree programs 20 across all institutions. Faculty work groups shall adopt a strategy for addressing significant differences in 21 prerequisites, including course substitutions. The Board of 22 Regents shall be notified by the Articulation Coordinating 23 24 Committee when significant differences remain. By fall 25 semester, 1996, Common degree program prerequisites shall be offered and accepted by all state universities and community 26 27 colleges, except in cases approved by the Board of Regents 28 pursuant to s. 240.209(5)(f). The Board of Regents shall work 29 with the State Board of Community Colleges on the development of a centralized database containing the list of courses and 30 31

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course substitutions that meet the prerequisite requirements
 for each baccalaureate degree program; and

3 (g) Expansion of the common course designation and 4 numbering system to include the numbering and designation of 5 college credit postsecondary vocational courses and facilitate 6 the transfer of credits between public schools and community 7 colleges. The Articulation Coordinating Committee shall:

8 Adopt guidelines for the participation of public 1. 9 school districts and community colleges in offering college 10 credit courses that may be transferred to a certificate or 11 degree program. These guidelines shall establish standards addressing faculty qualifications, admissions, program 12 13 curricula, participation in the common course designation and numbering system, and other issues identified by the Task 14 Force on Workforce Development and the Commissioner of 15 Education. Guidelines should also address the role of 16 17 accreditation in the designation of courses as transferable college credit. Such guidelines must not jeopardize the 18 19 accreditation status of educational institutions and must be 20 based on data related to the history of credit transfer among 21 institutions in this state and others.

22 2. Conduct a study identifying postsecondary
 23 vocational programs offered by community colleges and public
 24 school districts. The study shall also identify postsecondary
 25 vocational courses designated as college credit courses
 26 applicable toward a vocational degree. Such college credit
 27 courses must be identified within the common course numbering
 28 and designation system.

3. Appoint faculty committees representing both
community college and public school faculties to recommend a
standard program length and appropriate occupational

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1 completion points for each postsecondary vocational 2 certificate program and degree. A course designated as 3 college credit may be offered by a public school district or community college, provided the standards established in 4 5 subparagraph 1. are met; and. 6 (h) Development of common definitions necessary for 7 managing a uniform coordinated system of career education for 8 all levels of the state system of public education. 9 Section 2. Subsections (1) and (2) of section 240.115, 10 Florida Statutes, are amended to read: 11 240.115 Articulation agreement; acceleration mechanisms.--12 13 (1)(a) Articulation between secondary and postsecondary education; admission of associate in arts degree 14 graduates from Florida community colleges and state 15 universities; the use of acceleration mechanisms, including 16 17 nationally standardized examinations through which students may earn credit; general education requirements and common 18 19 course code numbers as provided for in s. 229.551(1)(f)4.; and 20 articulation among programs in nursing shall be governed by the articulation agreement, as established by the Department 21 of Education. The articulation agreement must specifically 22 provide that every associate in arts graduate of a Florida 23 24 community college shall have met all general education 25 requirements and must be granted admission to the upper division of a state university except to a limited access or 26 teacher certification program or a major program requiring an 27 28 audition. After admission has been granted to students under 29 provisions of this section and to university students who have successfully completed 60 credit hours of coursework, 30 31 including 36 hours of general education, and met the

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1 requirements of s. 240.107, admission shall be granted to 2 State University System and Florida community college students 3 who have successfully completed 60 credit hours of work, including 36 hours of general education. Community college 4 5 associate in arts graduates shall receive priority for 6 admission to a state university over out-of-state students. 7 Orientation programs and student handbooks provided to 8 freshman enrollees and transfer students at state universities must include an explanation of this provision of the 9 10 articulation agreement. 11 (b) Any student who transfers among regionally accredited postsecondary institutions that are fully 12 accredited by a regional or national accrediting agency 13 14 recognized by the United States Department of Education and that participate in the common course designation and 15 numbering system shall be awarded credit by the receiving 16 17 institution for courses satisfactorily completed by the student at the previous institutions. Credit shall be awarded 18 19 if the courses are judged by the appropriate common course 20 designation and numbering system faculty task force 21 representing community colleges, public universities, and participating private postsecondary education institutions to 22 be academically equivalent to courses offered at the receiving 23 24 institution, including equivalency of faculty credentials, 25 regardless of the public or nonpublic control of the previous institution. The Department of Education shall ensure that 26 27 credits to be accepted by a receiving institution are generated in courses for which the faculty possess credentials 28 29 that are comparable to those required by the accrediting 30 association of the receiving institution. The award of credit 31 may be limited to courses that are entered in the common 7

course designation and numbering system. Credits awarded
 pursuant to this subsection shall satisfy institutional
 requirements on the same basis as credits awarded to native
 students.

5 (2) The universities, community college district 6 boards of trustees, and district school boards are authorized 7 to establish intrainstitutional and interinstitutional 8 programs to maximize this articulation. Programs may include 9 upper-division-level courses offered at the community college, 10 distance learning, transfer agreements that facilitate the 11 transfer of credits between public and nonpublic postsecondary institutions, and the concurrent enrollment of students at a 12 13 community college and a state university to enable students to take any level of baccalaureate degree coursework. Should the 14 establishment of these programs necessitate the waiver of 15 existing State Board of Education rules, reallocation of 16 17 funds, or revision or modification of student fees, each 18 college or university shall submit the proposed articulation 19 program to the State Board of Education for review and approval. The State Board of Education is authorized to waive 20 its rules and make appropriate reallocations, revisions, or 21 modifications in accordance with the above. 22 Section 3. Subsection (1) of section 246.013, Florida 23 24 Statutes, is amended to read: 25 246.013 Participation in the common course designation 26 and numbering system .--27 (1) Nonpublic colleges and schools that have been 28 issued a regular license pursuant to s. 246.081(2), or 29 nonpublic postsecondary colleges that are exempt from state 30 licensure pursuant to s. 246.085(1)(a) and that are fully 31 accredited by a regional or national accrediting agency

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recognized by the United States Department of Education, by a 1 2 member of the Commission on Colleges of the Southern 3 Association of Colleges and Schools and accredited nonpublic 4 postsecondary colleges exempt from state licensure pursuant to 5 s. 246.085(1)(a) may participate in the common course б designation and numbering system pursuant to s. 229.551. 7 Participating colleges and schools shall bear the costs 8 associated with inclusion in the system and shall meet the 9 terms and conditions for institutional participation in the 10 system. The department shall adopt a fee schedule that 11 includes the expenses incurred through data processing, faculty task force travel and per diem, and staff and clerical 12 13 support time. Such fee schedule may differentiate between the costs associated with initial course inclusion in the system 14 15 and costs associated with subsequent course maintenance in the system. Decisions regarding initial course inclusion and 16 17 subsequent course maintenance must be made within 360 days after submission of the required materials and fees by the 18 19 institution. The Department of Education may select a date by which colleges must submit requests for new courses to be 20 included, and may delay review of courses submitted after that 21 date until the next year's cycle. Any college that currently 22 participates in the system, and that participated in the 23 24 system prior to July 1, 1986, shall not be required to pay the 25 costs associated with initial course inclusion in the system. Fees collected for participation in the common course 26 designation and numbering system pursuant to the provisions of 27 28 this section shall be deposited in the Institutional 29 Assessment Trust Fund created by s. 246.31. Any nonpublic, nonprofit college or university that is eligible to 30 31 participate in the common course designation and numbering 9

1 system shall not be required to pay the costs associated with 2 participation in the system. The Legislature finds and 3 declares that independent nonprofit colleges and universities 4 eligible to participate in the Florida resident access grant 5 program pursuant to s. 240.605 are an integral part of the б higher education system in this state and that a significant 7 number of state residents choose this form of higher 8 education. Any independent college or university that is 9 eligible to participate in the Florida resident access grant 10 program shall not be required to pay the costs associated with 11 participation in the common course designation and numbering 12 system. 13 Section 4. This act shall take effect July 1, 1998. 14 STATEMENT OF SUBSTANTIAL CHANGES CONTAINED IN COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR $\underline{SB\ 2160}$ 15 16 17 The proposed Committee Substitute amends laws to authorize nonpublic colleges to participate in the common course numbering system. Nonpublic schools will no longer be authorized to participate. 18 19 20 It authorizes colleges to be exempt from costs associated with the common course numbering system if they are: 21 22 Not-for-profit, nonpublic colleges, Accredited by a national or regional accrediting association, and 23 24 The accrediting association is recognized by the United States Department of Education. 25 26 It assures that an institution will not be required to accept credits from any other institution unless the Department of Education assures that faculty credentials are comparable to 27 those required by the receiving institution's accrediting 28 association. It allows review of new requests for courses to occur in 1-year cycles. Any request that is submitted after the date set by the department may be delayed until the next year's 29 30 cycle. 31 10
