Present subsections (12) through (30) of section 97.021, Florida Statutes, are redesignated as 12 13 subsections (13) through (31), respectively, and a new subsection (12) is added to that section to read: 14 15 97.021 Definitions.--For the purposes of this code, 16 except where the context clearly indicates otherwise, the 17 term: (12) "Legal residence" means the residence for which 18 19 the elector has filed for a homestead, and if no homestead has been claimed by the elector, the residence where the elector 20 has continuously resided for at least 90 days prior to the 21 registration day for the election in which the elector will 22 23 vote. 24 Section 2. Subsection (1) of section 101.62, Florida 25 Statutes, is amended to read: 101.62 Request for absentee ballots.--26 27 (1) The supervisor may accept a request for an absentee ballot only from an elector, which may be made only 28 29 by mail or in person or for an elector from any person

designated by such elector. The request for an absentee ballot

by mail may be honored only if the elector provides

documentation establishing that he or she will be physically unable to vote on the scheduled election date for one of the following reasons:

- (a) Infirmity, illness, or advanced age prevents the elector from attending the polls;
- (b) It is necessary that the elector be absent from the precinct of his or her residence during the hours the polls are open for voting on election day;
- (c) The elector is an inspector, a poll worker, a deputy voting-machine custodian, a deputy sheriff, a supervisor of elections, or a deputy supervisor who is assigned to a precinct different from that in which he or she is registered;
- (d) Because of the tenets of the elector's religion, he or she cannot attend the polls on the date of the general, special, or primary election;
- (e) The elector has changed his or her permanent residency to another county in this state within the time period during which the registration books are closed for the election (such an elector may vote only for national and statewide offices and statewide issues);
- (f) The elector has changed his or her permanent residency to another state and is unable under the laws of such state to vote in the general election (such an elector may vote only for President and Vice President).

26 The request for an absentee ballot made by the elector in

28 person shall be honored if the elector will be absent from the

29 precinct of his or her residence during the hours the polls

30 are open for voting on election day, and the voter agrees to

31 vote in person prior to the election. One request shall be

deemed sufficient to receive an absentee ballot for all elections that which are held within a calendar year, unless the elector or the elector's designee indicates at the time the request is made the elections for which the elector desires to receive an absentee ballot. Such request may be considered canceled when any first-class mail sent by the supervisor to the elector is returned as undeliverable. Such request may be made in person, by mail, or by telephone.

Section 3. Section 101.64, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

101.64 Delivery of absentee ballots; envelopes; form.--

(1) The supervisor shall enclose with each absentee ballot two envelopes: a secrecy envelope, into which the absent elector shall enclose his or her marked ballot; and a mailing envelope, into which the absent elector shall then place the secrecy envelope, which shall be addressed to the supervisor and also bear on the back side a certificate in substantially the following form:

Note: Please Read Instructions Carefully Before Marking Ballot and Completing Voter's Certificate.

VOTER'S CERTIFICATE

I, ...(print name)..., do solemnly swear or affirm that I am a qualified elector in this election, that I am unable to attend the polls on election day because of a reason set forth in s. 101.62(1), and that I have not and will not vote more than one ballot in this election. I understand that failure to sign this certificate and have my signature witnessed will invalidate my ballot.

The witnesses shall 18 19 print their names next to their signatures and shall also list their voter's registration number or driver's license number 20 for identification purposes on the certificate. The failure to 21 provide all this information invalidates the absentee ballot. 22 Section 4. Section 101.65, Florida Statutes, is 23 24 amended to read: 101.65 Instructions to absent electors.--The 25 supervisor shall enclose with each absentee ballot separate 26 27 printed instructions in substantially the following form: 28 29 READ THESE INSTRUCTIONS CAREFULLY BEFORE MARKING BALLOT. 1. VERY IMPORTANT. In order to ensure that your 30

absentee ballot will be counted, it should be completed and

returned as soon as possible so that it can reach the supervisor of elections of the county in which your precinct is located no later than 7 p.m. on the day of the election.

- 2. Mark your ballot in secret as instructed on the ballot.
- 3. Place your marked ballot in the enclosed secrecy envelope.
- 4. Insert the secrecy envelope into the enclosed mailing envelope which is addressed to the supervisor.
- 5. Seal the mailing envelope and completely fill out the Voter's Certificate on the back of the mailing envelope.
- 6. VERY IMPORTANT. Sign your name on the line above "(Voter's Signature)."
- 7. VERY IMPORTANT. In order for your absentee ballot to be counted, it must include the signature and address of two witnesses a witness 18 years of age or older affixed to the Voter's Certificate. These witnesses must also print their names next to their signatures and list their voter's registration number or driver's license number for identification on the certificate. No candidate may serve as an attesting witness.
- 8. Mail, deliver, or have delivered the completed mailing envelope. Be sure there is sufficient postage if mailed.
- 9. VERY IMPORTANT. Any person perpetrating or attempting to perpetrate or aid in the perpetration of any fraud in connection with an absentee ballot is guilty of a felony and can be imprisoned for up to 5 years.

104.012 Consideration for registration; interference with registration; soliciting registrations for compensation; alteration of registration application .--

- (1) Any person who gives anything of value that is redeemable in cash to any person in consideration for his or her becoming a registered voter commits a felony misdemeanor of the third first degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, or s. 775.083, or s. 775.084. This section shall not be interpreted, however, to exclude such services as transportation to the place of registration or baby-sitting in connection with the absence of an elector from home for registering.
- (2) A person who by bribery, menace, threat, or other corruption, directly or indirectly, influences, deceives, or deters or attempts to influence, deceive, or deter any person in the free exercise of that person's right to register to vote at any time, upon the first conviction, commits a felony misdemeanor of the third first degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, or s. 775.083, or s. 775.084, and, upon any subsequent conviction, commits a felony of the second third degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, s. 775.083, or s. 775.084.
- (3) A person may not solicit or pay another person to solicit voter registrations for compensation that is based upon the number of registrations obtained. A person who violates the provisions of this subsection commits a felony misdemeanor of the third first degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, or s. 775.083, or s. 775.084.
- (4) A person who alters the voter registration application of any other person, without the other person's 31 knowledge and consent, commits a felony misdemeanor of the

 third first degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, or s. 775.083, or s. 775.084.

Section 6. Section 104.013, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

104.013 Unauthorized use, possession, or destruction of voter registration identification card.--

- (1) It is unlawful for any person knowingly to have in his or her possession any blank, forged, stolen, fictitious, counterfeit, or unlawfully issued voter registration identification card unless possession by such person has been duly authorized by the supervisor.
- (2) It is unlawful for any person to barter, trade, sell, or give away a voter registration identification card unless said person has been duly authorized to issue a registration identification card.
- (3) It is unlawful for any person willfully to destroy or deface the registration identification card of a duly registered voter.
- (4) Any person who violates any of the provisions of this section commits a <u>felony misdemeanor</u> of the <u>third first</u> degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082₂ or s. 775.084.

Section 7. Section 104.031, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

104.031 False declaration to secure assistance in preparing ballot.—Any person who makes a false declaration for assistance in voting, or in the preparation of his or her ballot, in any election is guilty of a <u>felony misdemeanor</u> of the <u>third first</u> degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, or s. 775.083, or s. 775.084.

Section 104.042, Florida Statutes, is 2 created to read: 3 104.042 Fraud or misconduct in connection with an absentee ballot. -- Any person perpetrating or attempting to 4 5 perpetrate or aid in the perpetration of any fraud or misconduct in connection with an absentee ballot is quilty of 6 7 a felony of the third degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, s. 775.083, or <u>s. 775.084</u>. 1 (2) Accepts a pecuniary or other benefit in exchange 2 for a promise to vote for or against, or to refrain from 3 voting for or against, any candidate in any election,

 is guilty of a <u>felony misdemeanor</u> of the <u>third first</u> degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, or s. 775.083, or s. 775.084.

Section 11. Section 104.051, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

104.051 Violations; neglect of duty; corrupt practices.--

- (1) Any official who willfully violates any of the provisions of this election code shall be excluded from the polls. Any election official who is excluded shall be replaced as provided in this code.
- (2) Any official who willfully refuses or willfully neglects to perform his or her duties as prescribed by this election code is guilty of a misdemeanor of the first degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082 or s. 775.083.
- (3) Any official who performs his or her duty as prescribed by this election code fraudulently or corruptly is guilty of a felony of the third degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, s. 775.083, or s. 775.084.
- (4) Any supervisor, deputy supervisor, or election employee who attempts to influence or interfere with any elector voting a ballot is guilty of a <u>felony misdemeanor</u> of the <u>third first</u> degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, or s. 775.083, or s. 775.084.

Section 12. Section 104.0515, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

104.0515 Voting rights; deprivation of, or interference with, prohibited; penalty.--

- (1) All citizens of this state who are otherwise qualified by law to vote at any election by the people in this state or in any district, county, city, town, municipality, school district, or other subdivision of this state shall be entitled and allowed to vote at all such elections without distinction according to race, color, or previous condition of servitude, notwithstanding any law, ordinance, regulation, custom, or usage to the contrary.
 - (2) No person acting under color of law shall:
- (a) In determining whether any individual is qualified under law to vote in any election, apply any standard, practice, or procedure different from the standards, practices, or procedures applied under law to other individuals within the same political subdivision who have been found to be qualified to vote; or
- (b) Deny the right of any individual to vote in any election because of an error or omission on any record or paper relating to any application, registration, or other act requisite to voting, if such error or omission is not material in determining whether such individual is qualified under law to vote in such election. This paragraph shall apply to absentee ballots only if there is a pattern or history of discrimination on the basis of race, color, or previous condition of servitude in regard to absentee ballots.
- (3) No person, whether acting under color of law or otherwise, shall intimidate, threaten, or coerce, or attempt to intimidate, threaten, or coerce, any other person for the purpose of interfering with the right of such other person to vote or not to vote as that person may choose, or for the

purpose of causing such other person to vote for, or not vote for, any candidate for any office at any general, special, or primary election held solely or in part for the purpose of selecting or electing any such candidate.

- (4) No voting qualification or prerequisite to voting, and no standard, practice, or procedure, shall be imposed or applied by any political subdivision of this state to deny or abridge the right of any citizen to vote on account of race or color.
- (5) Any person who violates the provisions of this section is guilty of a felony misdemeanor of the third first degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, or s. 775.083, or s. 775.084.

Section 13. Section 104.061, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

104.061 Corruptly influencing voting.--

- Whoever by bribery, menace, threat, or other corruption whatsoever, either directly or indirectly, attempts to influence, deceive, or deter any elector in voting or interferes with him or her in the free exercise of the elector's right to vote at any election is guilty of a felony misdemeanor of the third first degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, or s. 775.083, or s. 775.084 for the first conviction, and a felony of the second third degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, s. 775.083, or s. 775.084, for any subsequent conviction.
- (2) No person shall directly or indirectly give or promise anything of value to another intending thereby to buy that person's or another's vote or to corruptly influence that person or another in casting his or her vote. Any person who 31 violates this subsection is guilty of a felony of the third

 degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, s. 775.083, or s. 775.084. However, this subsection shall not apply to the serving of food to be consumed at a political rally or meeting or to any item of nominal value which is used as a political advertisement, including a campaign message designed to be worn by a person.

Section 14. Section 104.081, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

104.081 Threats of employers to control votes of employees.—It shall be unlawful for any person having one or more persons in his or her service as employees to discharge or threaten to discharge any employee in his or her service for voting or not voting in any election, state, county, or municipal, for any candidate or measure submitted to a vote of the people. Any person who violates the provisions of this section is guilty of a <u>felony misdemeanor</u> of the <u>third first</u> degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, or s. 775.084.

Section 15. Section 104.185, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

- 104.185 Petitions; knowingly signing more than once; signing another person's name or a fictitious name.--
- (1) A person who knowingly signs a petition or petitions for a candidate, a minor political party, or an issue more than one time commits a <u>felony misdemeanor</u> of the <u>third first</u> degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, or s. 775.084.
- (2) A person who signs another person's name or a fictitious name to any petition to secure ballot position for a candidate, a minor political party, or an issue commits a

felony misdemeanor of the third first degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, or s. 775.083, or s. 775.084. Section 16. This act shall take effect July 1, 1998. SENATE SUMMARY Amends various sections of the Florida Election Code. Amends various sections of the Fiorida Election Code. Increases the criminal penalty for violations or provisions of the code including unlawful acts relating to registration of voters, unauthorized use or destruction of a voter registration identification card, false declarations to secure assistance in preparing a ballot perpetrating or aiding in the perpetration of any ballot, perpetrating or aiding in the perpetration of any fraud or misconduct in connection with an absentee ballot, vote selling, specified corrupt practices, interference with or deprivation of voting rights, corruptly influencing voting, and threats to employees.
