Section 401.272, Florida Statutes, is 20 created to read: 21 401.272 Limited preventive health care tasks; emergency 22 medical technicians and paramedics. --23 (1) LEGISLATIVE INTENT. -- The purpose of this section is to encourage the more effective use of the skills of 24 25 paramedics and emergency medical technicians by enabling emergency medical services' medical directors to delegate 26 27 limited preventive health care tasks to qualified paramedics 2.8 and emergency medical technicians when such delegation is 29 consistent with improving the public's health and welfare. 30 (2) PERFORMANCE OF BLOOD PRESSURE SCREENING AND

CHILDHOOD IMMUNIZATIONS BY PARAMEDICS AND EMERGENCY MEDICAL

TECHNICIANS.--Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a paramedic or emergency medical technician may perform blood pressure screening or childhood immunization if the medical director verifies that the paramedic or emergency medical technician is trained or experienced to render such services under the supervision and specific protocol of a medical director.

Blood pressure screening may only be performed when the medical director has a signed agreement to carry out such functions as part of an American Heart Association protocol for referral and followup.

- (b) Childhood immunizations may only be performed when the medical director has a written agreement with a county health department specifying a protocol for such immunizations.
- (3) VERIFICATION OF TRAINING AND EXPERIENCE.--Each medical director delegating blood pressure screening or childhood immunization to a paramedic or emergency medical technician must verify and document in the emergency medical services' licensure file that the paramedic or emergency medical technician has the appropriate training and experience to conduct blood pressure screening or childhood immunizations under this section. Such verification, using forms developed by the department, must be available for inspection by the department as part of the department's routine licensure inspection process.
- (4) EXISTING PROGRAMS.--This section may not be construed to eliminate or supersede existing laws relating to other paramedic or emergency medical technician emergency medical services. It is the intent of this section to supplement all such existing programs relating to the

certification and practice of paramedics and emergency medical technicians as authorized by law.

Section 2. Subsection (4) is added to section 401.265, Florida Statutes, to read:

401.265 Medical directors.--

emergency medical technician to perform blood pressure screening or childhood immunization on any patient under a protocol as specified in s. 401.272, which is not in the provision of emergency care, is liable for any act or omission of any paramedic or emergency medical technician acting under his or her supervision and control when performing such services.

Section 3. Subsection (1) of section 401.411, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

401.411 Disciplinary action; penalties.--

- (1) The department may deny, suspend, or revoke a license, certificate, or permit or may reprimand or fine any licensee, certificateholder, or other person operating under this part for any of the following grounds:
- (a) The violation of any rule of the department or any provision of this part.
- (b) Being found guilty of, or pleading nolo contendere to, regardless of adjudication in any jurisdiction, a crime that relates to practice as an emergency medical technician or paramedic, or to practice in any other occupation, when operating under this part.
  - (c) Addiction to alcohol or any controlled substance.
- (d) Engaging in or attempting to engage in the possession, except in legitimate duties under the supervision

of a licensed physician, or the sale or distribution of any controlled substance as set forth in chapter 893.

- (e) The conviction in any court in any state or in any federal court of a felony, unless the person's civil rights have been restored.
- (f) Knowingly making false or fraudulent claims; procuring, attempting to procure, or renewing a certificate, license, or permit by fakery, fraudulent action, or misrepresentation.
- (g) Unprofessional conduct, including, but not limited to, any departure from or failure to conform to the minimal prevailing standards of acceptable practice as an emergency medical technician or paramedic, including undertaking activities that the emergency medical technician or paramedic is not qualified by training or experience to perform.
- (h) Sexual misconduct with a patient, including inducing or attempting to induce the patient to engage, or engaging or attempting to engage the patient, in sexual activity.
- (i) The failure to give to the department, or its authorized representative, true information upon request regarding an alleged or confirmed violation of this part or rule of the department.
- (j) Fraudulent or misleading advertising or advertising in an unauthorized category.
- (k) Practicing as an emergency medical technician, paramedic, or other health care professional operating under this part without reasonable skill and safety to patients by reason of illness, drunkenness, or the use of drugs, narcotics, or chemicals or any other substance or as a result of any mental or physical condition.

(1) The failure to report to the department any person known to be in violation of this part. Section 4. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law. SENATE SUMMARY Provides that medical directors may allow paramedics and emergency medical technicians to perform blood pressure screenings and childhood immunizations under certain circumstances. Provides that medical directors are liable for the acts of such persons when they are under the medical director's supervision and control.
