A bill to be entitled 1 2 An act relating to health care; creating s. 3 381.0045, F.S.; creating the "Targeted Outreach 4 for Pregnant Women Act of 1998"; providing 5 purpose; requiring the Department of Health to establish a pilot program; providing б 7 requirements; requiring interim and final reports; providing an appropriation; providing 8 9 an effective date. 10 WHEREAS, Florida ranks second in the nation in the 11 12 number of female AIDS cases and pediatric AIDS cases, and WHEREAS, approximately 700 HIV-infected women give 13 14 birth each year in Florida, and WHEREAS, the administration of Zidovudine (AZT) to 15 pregnant HIV-infected women can reduce the rate of 16 17 mother-to-child transmission by as much as two-thirds, while without it approximately 210 of the 700 babies born to 18 19 HIV-infected women in Florida would test positive for HIV, and WHEREAS, thousands of infants born each year in Florida 20 are identified as prenatally substance-exposed, and 21 22 WHEREAS, the effect on a fetus from drugs can result in 23 a lifetime of devastating physical and mental problems for the 24 child, and WHEREAS, the lifetime cost of treating an HIV-infected 25 26 infant can be as high as \$200,000, and the cost of caring for 27 drug-exposed infants can be as high as \$65,000, with special classes for substance-exposed children costing approximately 28 29 \$17,000 per year, and WHEREAS, there is a strong need to reach out to 30 pregnant women who do not seek prenatal care, substance abuse 31 1 CODING: Words stricken are deletions; words underlined are additions.

treatment, or HIV testing due to poverty, lack of 1 transportation, lack of education, lack of health insurance, 2 3 fear of legal consequences, fear of domestic violence, and 4 fear of losing their child, and 5 WHEREAS, preventing perinatally transmitted HIV 6 infection and substance exposure depends on maximizing the 7 opportunities for pregnant women to learn their HIV status, to be offered and receive preventive AZT therapy, and to gain 8 9 access to drug treatment and other health and social services 10 for themselves and their infants, NOW, THEREFORE, 11 12 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: 13 14 Section 1. Section 381.0045, Florida Statutes, is 15 created to read: 16 381.0045 Targeted outreach for pregnant women.--17 (1) This section may be cited as the "Targeted Outreach for Pregnant Women Act of 1998." 18 19 (2) It is the purpose of this section to establish a 20 targeted outreach program for high-risk pregnant women who may not seek proper prenatal care, who suffer from substance abuse 21 problems, or who are infected with human immunodeficiency 22 23 virus (HIV), and to provide these women with links to much 24 needed services and information. (3) Effective October 1, 1998, the Department of 25 26 Health shall establish a 2-year pilot program to provide 27 outreach services to high-risk pregnant women, based in county health departments in the five counties with the highest rates 28 29 of HIV infection in pregnant women and the largest proportion of substance-exposed newborns. These counties shall include 30 Dade, Broward, Palm Beach, Hillsborough, and Orange Counties. 31 2

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1 (4) The department shall: 2 (a) Conduct outreach programs through contracts with, 3 grants to, or other working relationships with persons or 4 entities where the target population is likely to be found. 5 (b) Provide outreach that is peer-based, culturally 6 sensitive, and performed in a nonjudgmental manner. 7 (c) Encourage high-risk pregnant women of unknown 8 status to be tested for HIV. 9 (d) Educate women not receiving prenatal care as to the benefits of such care. 10 (e) Provide HIV-infected pregnant women with 11 12 information so they can make an informed decision about the 13 use of Zidovudine (AZT). (f) Link women with substance abuse treatment, when 14 15 available, and act as a liaison with Healthy Start coalitions, children's medical services, Ryan White-funded providers, and 16 17 other services of the Department of Health. 18 (g) Provide continued oversite to HIV-infected 19 newborns. 20 (5) The types of entities the department is encouraged 21 to contract with, provide grants to, or enter into other working relationships with may include, but are not limited 22 23 to, faith-based organizations, academic institutions, religious organizations, nonprofit community centers, and 24 other social-services-related entities. 25 26 Section 2. The Department of Health shall compile and analyze the risk information collected by the targeted 27 28 outreach programs and other services of the Department of 29 Health, including Healthy Start coalitions, children's medical services, and Ryan White-funded providers, and submit to the 30 Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and the 31 3

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President of the Senate an interim report by December 1, 1999, 1 and a final report by December 1, 2000, that includes, but is 2 3 not limited to: 4 (1) The number of pregnant women and infants 5 identified as at potential risk of HIV infection or substance 6 abuse. 7 (2) The number of pregnant women and infants who 8 receive outreach services. 9 (3) The demand for services and unmet need for services for the identified target groups. 10 (4) An assessment of the program's success in reaching 11 12 high-risk pregnant women and providing these women and their infants with much needed services and information. 13 14 (5) Recommendations regarding whether the program 15 should be continued or expanded statewide, the funding 16 necessary to continue or expand the program, and any 17 additional efforts that are necessary to maximize the success 18 of the program. 19 Section 3.
