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18	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
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20	Section 1. Section 228.058, Florida Statutes, is

24	(1) SHORT TITLEThis section may be cited as the
25	"Online High School Act."
26	(2) ESTABLISHMENTThere is established a public
27	school to be known as The Florida High School. The school
28	shall provide instruction to students throughout the state and
29	shall be administered by the School Board of Alachua County.
30	(3) MISSIONThe mission of The Florida High School

31 shall be the provision of online computer-mediated curriculum

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and instruction. Programs of study to achieve the mission of the school shall embody the goals and standards of Florida's system of school improvement and education accountability, established pursuant to ss. 229.591 and 229.592, and shall ensure an appropriate education for its students.

- (a) The school shall emphasize progressive, sequential academic development. The primary goal of the school is to enhance instruction and student performance skills by using resources created for, and made available through, online electronic media, to develop in students the skills necessary to take advantage of distance learning programs at the postsecondary level, and to provide opportunities for advanced placement into such programs.
- (b) The school shall provide to secondary teachers throughout the state access to its curriculum and instructional methods for staff development purposes and as a general classroom resource.
- (c) The exceptional student education programs offered at the school shall be determined by the adaptability of the medium to the needs of the student. The fact that the school offers exceptional student education programs in no way lessens the general responsibility of the student's home school district to provide exceptional student education programs.
- (4) STUDENT ADMISSIONS.--The school shall abide by the provisions of the Florida Educational Equity Act, pursuant to s. 228.2001, and be open for enrollment on either a part-time or full-time basis to:
- 29 (a) General education students or exceptional
 30 education students statewide who are currently functioning at
 31 academic grade levels 9-12.

- (b) Adult education students who are functioning at academic grade levels 9-12 and working toward a high school diploma.
- (c) Residents in Department of Corrections' facilities who are functioning at academic grade levels 9-12 and have not received a high school diploma or its equivalent.
- (d) Homebound and hospitalized students who are functioning at academic grade levels 9-12 on a temporary basis to ensure continuity of their education.
- (e) Children of migrant workers, regardless of their current district of residence within the state, who are functioning at academic grade levels 9-12.
- not be charged a fee for participation in the school's program. Out-of-state students enrolled in the school may be charged a fee equal to, but not exceeding, the average per student expenditure of in-state students enrolled in the school. The cost of technologies necessary to access the school, as well as linking to the national information infrastructure, shall be borne by the student or, if a student is enrolled as part of a school-based program in a participating school district, the cost shall be borne by the school district in which the school-based program is offered.
 - (6) PERSONNEL.--
- (a) At the discretion of the School Board of Alachua

 County, the school may employ an administrative staff

 consisting of a principal and assistant principals. The

 administrative staff shall be employed by the School Board of

 Alachua County and shall have the following duties:
- 1. The principal shall be the chief executive officer and shall oversee the educational programs of the school, the

technological platform of the school, affiliation agreements with organizations external to the School Board of Alachua County, collaborative relationships between school districts for the provision of services, and the daily operation and administration of the school. The principal shall be responsible for recommending policy to the advisory board of directors. The principal shall be accountable for the financial resources of the school.

- 2. An assistant principal for educational programs shall be the chief educational officer and shall oversee the educational programs of the school. The assistant principal for educational programs shall be accountable for instruction, curriculum development, facilitation, guidance services, staff development, and the daily operation and administration of the school.
- 3. An assistant principal for technologies shall be the chief technology officer of the school. The assistant principal for technologies shall be accountable for the development and maintenance of the computers, networks, and related equipment upon which the school resides, the network links to outside vendors and resources, the development of the technologies utilized in instruction and curriculum, and the daily operation and administration of the technological platform of the school.
- (b) At the discretion of the School Board of Alachua County, the school may employ a professional staff consisting of teachers, guidance personnel, and staff development experts. The professional staff shall be the faculty of the school and shall be employed by the School Board of Alachua County. The faculty of the school shall be divided into four distinct functions as follows:

- 1. Curriculum developers shall be responsible for the development and maintenance of the instructional programs of the school. The curriculum developers may be employed by the School Board of Alachua County or may be contractees employed by other school districts in the state. If employed by the School Board of Alachua County, curriculum developers shall be retained as teachers on special assignment and shall receive supplements and release time for that portion of the school day allocated to maintaining the curriculum of The Florida High School.
- 2. Facilitators shall be responsible for providing assistance, advice, and academic guidance to students enrolled in the school. Facilitators may be employed by the School Board of Alachua County or may be contractees employed by other school districts in the state. If employed by the School Board of Alachua County, facilitators shall be retained as teachers on special assignment and shall receive supplements and release time for that portion of the school day allocated to maintaining the curriculum of The Florida High School.
- 3. Guidance personnel shall be responsible for all normal services provided by a school guidance department, plus additional services that may be unique to needs of students enrolled in The Florida High School. Guidance personnel shall be employed by the School Board of Alachua County and shall provide services to all students enrolled in the school, regardless of geographic location.
- 4. Staff development personnel shall be responsible for developing and providing training to personnel of the school and to education professionals statewide regarding the resources of the school and shall actively pursue and develop

staff development opportunities that can be successfully delivered through the medium of the school. Staff development 2 personnel may be employed by the School Board of Alachua 3 4 County or may be contractees. 5 Faculty members shall meet the certification requirements of 6 7 ss. 231.02, 231.095, and 231.096. (7) ADVISORY BOARD. -- The intent and provisions of 8 9 Florida's system of school improvement and education 10 accountability specify that, pursuant to s. 229.58, each public school in the state shall establish a school advisory 11 council that is reflective of the population served by the 12 13 school and is responsible for the development and evaluation of the school improvement plan pursuant to s. 230.23(18). The 14 15 Florida High School shall comply with the provisions of s. 229.58 by establishing an advisory board of directors 16 17 consisting of five representatives from school districts other than Alachua County, two representatives from the Department 18 19 of Education, two representatives from the business community 20 with statewide representation, two representatives from the 21 Department of Corrections, two representatives from 22 postsecondary education, two representatives from parent 23 groups with statewide representation, and two representatives 24 at large. The board shall: 25 (a) Provide leadership and support in the efforts to 26 ensure the fiscal viability of the school. 27 (b) Develop and recommend guidelines for the appropriate distribution of funds to participating school 28 29 districts. 30

- (c) Serve as an advisory board in allocating curriculum development tasks to participating school districts.
- (d) Serve as a review board for maintaining the quality of curriculum and instruction offered to students in the school.
- (e) Advise the staff on affiliation agreements with other school districts and third-party vendors associated with the school.
- (f) Assist in developing policies and procedures for the effective operation of the school.
- (g) Address issues of general concern to the operation of the school as they arise.
 - (8) FUNDING.--

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(a) The proportional share of operating funds from the Florida Education Finance Program, as provided in s. 236.081, and the General Appropriations Act for The Florida High School shall be allocated to the school as a separate entity from the allocation to the School Board of Alachua County. The School Board of Alachua County shall serve as fiscal agent for the school. The nonvoted ad valorem millage that would otherwise be required for the school shall be allocated from state funds. The required local effort funds calculated pursuant to s. 236.081 shall be allocated from state funds to the school as a part of the allocation of operating funds pursuant to s. 236.081. The school shall receive its proportional share of all categorical funds and new categorical funds enacted after July 1, 1997, for the purpose of secondary academic program enhancement with the exception of funds for student transportation, pursuant to s. 236.083. The school shall not receive a sparsity supplement, pursuant to s. 236.081(6).

- (b) It is the intent of the Legislature to allow the statewide online educational program the ability to generate operating funds based on student performance notwithstanding the provisions of s. 236.013. For the purposes of The Florida High School, the following provisions apply:
- 1. A "full-time equivalent student" is a student who is registered simultaneously for six courses in The Florida High School.
- 2. A "part-time student" is a student who is registered simultaneously for fewer than six courses in The Florida High School.
- 3. The district cost differential for the school shall equal the average district cost differential of the 67 county contiguous school districts of the state.
- 4. The program cost factors as described in s. 236.081(1)(c) shall apply with the following exceptions:
- a. Unless other program cost factors apply, any enrolled student 18 years of age or younger shall be classified in the program cost factor of basic programs, grades 9, 10, 11, and 12, for weighted full-time equivalent calculations.
- b. Unless other program cost factors apply, any enrolled student 19 years of age or older shall be classified in the program cost factor of adult general education programs, adult secondary education, for weighted full-time equivalent calculations.
- 5. The funds allocated to The Florida High School shall be calculated using the average funds per weighted FTE of the 67 county contiguous school districts of the state.
- 6. The following formula shall apply for the allocation of funds to The Florida High School:

- a. Funds shall be allocated to the school based on course registration and student performance. For each course registration, the school shall be allocated one-sixth of the average funds per weighted FTE of the 67 county contiguous school districts of the state.
- b. Funds shall be allocated to the school quarterly,on July 1, October 1, January 1, and April 1.
 - c. Quarterly allocation shall be made as follows:
- (I) For each course in which a student has registered since the last allocation date, the school shall receive one-half of the allocation for registration in that course.

 For each student who has completed one-half of the competencies and skills for a course during the time period between the last allocation date and the current allocation being calculated, the school shall receive one-fourth of the allocation for registration in that course. For each student who has completed all course requirements during the time period between the last allocation date and the current allocation being calculated, the school shall receive the remaining one-fourth of the allocation for registration in that course.
- (II) The allocation shall be made to The Florida High School and forwarded to the school's fiscal agent, and all funds less administrative fees to the fiscal agent for oversight shall be placed in an account for the operation of the school.
- (9) PUBLIC EMPLOYER.--The School Board of Alachua
 County shall be the public employer of school personnel for
 collective bargaining purposes unless such personnel are
 employed by another school district and providing services to
 the The Florida High School through special contract. In such

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   situation, the home school district of the contracted
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   personnel shall be the public employer of the personnel.
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          (10) AUDIT.--
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          (a) The Auditor General shall include The Florida High
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   School within the scope of his or her annual financial and
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   compliance audits of the School Board of Alachua County. The
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   Auditor General shall further conduct compliance and program
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   audits of the school no less than once every 10 years.
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          (b) A report of the audit findings shall be provided
   to the school, the School Board of Alachua County, the State
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   Board of Education, the President of the Senate, and the
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   Speaker of the House of Representatives.
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          (11) EXCEPTIONS TO LAW.--To encourage innovative
   practices and facilitate the development of online media as an
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   educational delivery tool, in addition to the exceptions to
   law specified in s. 229.592(6), the following statutes or
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   related rules may be waived by The Florida High School
   provided the general statutory purpose of each section is met
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   and the school has submitted a request to the Department of
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   Education for approval: ss. 230.655, 232.02, 232.021,

          (12) IMPLEMENTATION. -- The State Board of Education
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   shall adopt any rules necessary to facilitate the
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   implementation of this section.

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********** HOUSE SUMMARY Creates the "Online High School Act" to provide for the establishment of The Florida High School, a public school administered by the School Board of Alachua County. Specifies the school mission to provide online computer-mediated curriculum and instruction statewide. Provides student admission and fee policies. Provides administrative and professional staff requirements. Provides for establishment of an advisory board of directors and specifies duties thereof. Provides for school funding, a public employer, annual audits, and school funding, a public employer, annual audits, and rulemaking. Authorizes the waiver of statutes or related rules to facilitate the development of online media as an educational delivery tool.
