I. <u>SUMMARY</u>:

HB 4123 (formerly PCB LT 98-03) creates a public records exemption for criminal records, juvenile records, and abuse hotline information that is obtained by the Agency for Health Care Administration in connection with background screening requirements that apply to an employee or a prospective employee of a nursing facility.

The bill creates a specific public records exemption from the provisions of s. 119.07(1), F.S., and Art. I, Sec. 24(a), Florida Constitution. It provides that the Legislature finds this exemption to be a public necessity in order to not discourage qualified applicants from seeking employment in nursing facilities. The public records exemption contained in this bill is subject to the Open Government Sunset Review Act of 1995. This exemption will be automatically repealed on October 2, 2003.

The bill has no fiscal impact on state or local governments.

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II. SUBSTANTIVE RESEARCH:

A. PRESENT SITUATION:

Public Records Laws

Article I, s. 24, Florida Constitution, expresses Florida's public policy regarding access to government records in providing that:

(a) Every person has the right to inspect or copy any public records made or received in connection with the official business of any public body, officer, or employee of the state, or persons acting on their behalf, except with respect to records exempted pursuant to this section or specifically made confidential by this Constitution. This section specifically includes the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of government and each agency or department created thereunder; counties, municipalities, and districts; and each constitutional officer, board, and commission, or entity created pursuant to law or this Constitution.

Article I, s. 24, Florida Constitution, permits the Legislature to provide by general law for the exemption of records from the requirements of s. 24. The general law exempting the records must state with specificity the public necessity justifying the exemption and can be no broader than necessary to accomplish the stated purpose of the law.

The Florida Statutes clearly indicates Florida public policy regarding access to government records. Section 119.07, F.S., provides:

Every person who has custody of a public record shall permit the record to be inspected and examined by any person desiring to do so, at a reasonable time, under reasonable conditions, and under supervision by the custodian of the public record or the custodian's designee.

Section 119.15, F.S., provides that an exemption may be created or maintained only if it serves an identifiable public purpose and may be no broader than is necessary to meet the public purpose it serves. An identifiable public purpose is served if the exemption meets one of the following purposes and the Legislature finds that the purpose is sufficiently compelling to override the strong public policy of open government and cannot be accomplished without the exemption:

- 1. Allows the state or its political subdivisions to effectively and efficiently administer a governmental program, which administration would be significantly impaired without the exemption;
- 2. Protects information of a sensitive personal nature concerning individuals, the release of which information would be defamatory to such individuals or cause unwarranted damage to the good name or reputation of such individuals or would jeopardize the safety of such individuals. However, in exemptions under this subparagraph, only information that would identify the individuals may be exempted; or

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3. Protects information of a confidential nature concerning entities, including, but not limited to, a formula, pattern, device, combination of devices, or compilation of information which is used to protect or further a business advantage over those who do not know or use it, the disclosure of which information would injure the affected entity in the marketplace.

Currently, the Agency for Health Care Administration does not obtain background screening information for the employment of nursing home employees. However, under the provisions of pending legislation it would be required to establish and maintain a database of screening information on certain nursing home employees and prospective employees.

B. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

The bill creates a specific public records exemption from the provisions of s. 119.07(1), F.S., and Art. I, Sec. 24(a), Florida Constitution, thereby protecting from public disclosure criminal records, juvenile records, and abuse hotline information obtained by the Agency for Health Care Administration in connection with background screening of employees and prospective employees of nursing facilities. The public records exemption contained in this bill is subject to the Open Government Sunset Review Act of 1995. This exemption will be automatically repealed on October 2, 2003.

The bill provides that the legislature finds this public records exemption to be a public necessity in order not to discourage qualified applicants from seeking employment at nursing homes.
