A bill to be entitled An act relating to postsecondary education; establishing the Program in Medical Sciences as a 2-year medical school within the Florida State University; providing legislative findings and intent; amending s. 458.3145, F.S.; providing for the issuance of a medical faculty certificate without examination to an individual who has received a full-time faculty appointment to teach a program of medicine at Florida State University; requiring the Board of Regents to commission an independent study; providing components of the study; providing for submission of the study to the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives by January 1, 1999; providing an effective date and a future contingent effective date. WHEREAS, the Legislature finds that more than 3.5 million Florida residents are over 60 years of age, and WHEREAS, of those 3.5 million people, almost one million are over 80 years of age, and WHEREAS, while this segment of Florida's citizenry represents almost one-fourth of Florida's total population, it accounts for the majority of visits to physicians, and WHEREAS, it is therefore the finding of the Legislature that the health needs of this population are significant, unique, and require specialized medical training, and WHEREAS, it is the further finding of the Legislature

of Florida's population should be focused on primary care with a clinical orientation in geriatric medicine, and

WHEREAS, it is therefore the intent of the Legislature to establish a medical school whose primary focus is recruiting and training medical professionals to serve this population and to serve as a resource for providing and directing medical care for the elderly in this state, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. The Program in Medical Sciences (PIMS) at the Florida State University is established as a 2-year medical program within the Florida State University. After the initial 2-year academic education is provided at the Florida State University, in Leon County, with rotation in local community hospitals, the second 2-year clinical rotation for Program In Medical Sciences (PIMS) students will include experience in underserved areas and will be coordinated with the University of Florida and the Mayo Clinic in Jacksonville, Florida. The medical degree will be conferred by the University of Florida. Students will be actively recruited from underserved rural and urban areas of Florida, and all training will emphasize the unique medical needs of Florida's elder citizens.

Section 2. Paragraph (i) of subsection (1) and subsection (4) of section 458.3145, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

458.3145 Medical faculty certificate.--

30 (1) A medical faculty certificate may be issued 31 without examination to an individual who:

- (a) Is a graduate of an accredited medical school or its equivalent, or is a graduate of a foreign medical school listed with the World Health Organization;
- (b) Holds a valid, current license to practice medicine in another jurisdiction;
- (c) Has completed the application form and remitted a nonrefundable application fee not to exceed \$500;
- (d) Has completed an approved residency or fellowship of at least 1 year or has received training which has been determined by the board to be equivalent to the 1-year residency requirement;
  - (e) Is at least 21 years of age;
  - (f) Is of good moral character;
- (g) Has not committed any act in this or any other jurisdiction which would constitute the basis for disciplining a physician under s. 458.331;
- (h) For any applicant who has graduated from medical school after October 1, 1992, has completed, before entering medical school, the equivalent of 2 academic years of preprofessional, postsecondary education, as determined by rule of the board, which must include, at a minimum, courses in such fields as anatomy, biology, and chemistry; and
- (i) Has been offered and has accepted a full-time faculty appointment to teach in a program of medicine at:
  - 1. The University of Florida,
  - 2. The University of Miami,
  - 3. The University of South Florida, or
  - 4. Florida State University, or
  - 5.4. The Mayo Clinic Jacksonville, Florida.
- 30 (2) The certificate authorizes the holder to practice 31 only in conjunction with his or her faculty position at an

accredited medical school and its affiliated clinical facilities or teaching hospitals that are registered with the Board of Medicine as sites at which holders of medical faculty certificates will be practicing. Such certificate automatically expires when the holder's relationship with the medical school is terminated or after a period of 24 months, whichever occurs sooner, and is renewable every 2 years by a holder who applies to the board on a form prescribed by the board and provides certification by the dean of the medical school that the holder is a distinguished medical scholar and an outstanding practicing physician.

- (3) The holder of a medical faculty certificate issued under this section has all rights and responsibilities prescribed by law for the holder of a license issued under s. 458.311, except as specifically provided otherwise by law. Such responsibilities include compliance with continuing medical education requirements as set forth by rule of the board. A hospital or ambulatory surgical center licensed under chapter 395, health maintenance organization certified under chapter 641, insurer as defined in s. 624.03, multiple-employer welfare arrangement as defined in s. 624.437, or any other entity in this state, in considering and acting upon an application for staff membership, clinical privileges, or other credentials as a health care provider, may not deny the application of an otherwise qualified physician for such staff membership, clinical privileges, or other credentials solely because the applicant is a holder of a medical faculty certificate under this section.
- (4) In any year, the maximum number of extendedmedical faculty certificate holders as provided in subsection(2) may not exceed 15 persons at each institution named in

subparagraphs  $(1)(i)1.-\underline{4.3.}$  and at the facility named in s. 240.512 and may not exceed 5 persons at the institution named in subparagraph (1)(i)5.4.

- 5. Annual review of all such certificate recipients will be made by the deans of the accredited 4-year medical schools within this state and reported to the Board of Medicine.
- (5) Notwithstanding subsection (1), any physician, when providing medical care or treatment in connection with the education of students, residents, or faculty at the request of the dean of an accredited medical school within this state or at the request of the medical director of a statutory teaching hospital as defined in s. 408.07, may do so upon registration with the board and demonstration of financial responsibility pursuant to s. 458.320(1) or (2) unless such physician is exempt under s. 458.320(5)(a). The performance of such medical care or treatment must be limited to a single period of time, which may not exceed 180 consecutive days, and must be rendered within a facility registered under subsection (2) or within a statutory teaching hospital as defined in s. 408.07. A registration fee not to exceed \$300, as set by the board, is required of each physician registered under this subsection. However, no more than three physicians per year per institution may be registered under this subsection, and an exemption under this subsection may not be granted to a physician more than once in any given 5-year period.

Section 3. (1) The Board of Regents is directed to commission an independent study of medical education in Florida. In commissioning the study, the Board of Regents shall solicit the involvement of affected universities in

Florida and clinical facilities, including the Mayo Clinic in Jacksonville, with which the universities propose to affiliate in order to provide clinical components of the curriculum. The purpose of the study shall be to assess the current adequacy and capacity of the state's undergraduate and graduate medical education and training programs by determining whether older Floridians have access to an adequate supply of geriatricians and primary care physicians who understand the unique medical needs of Florida's elders, and whether underrepresented populations have fair and adequate access to medical education and training in Florida. The study shall include:

- (a) Recommended strategies to ensure access to medical education by people from underserved rural and urban areas.
- (b) Recommended strategies to increase the production of primary care physicians who understand the unique medical needs of Florida's elders.
- (c) Issues that may be raised by the Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME) and recommendations to resolve such issues. The Liaison Committee on Medical Education shall be invited to Florida in order to identify any areas of concern in order to clarify and reach agreement regarding actions necessary to address LCME concerns.
- (d) A specific study of the fiscal and programmatic implications of adding a second year to the Program in Medical Sciences (PIMS) at Florida State University as provided for in this act.
- (e) Recommended strategies, an implementation plan, and a timeline to achieve the objectives of the study and an estimate of the fiscal and programmatic considerations associated with each recommendation.

The study shall be considered by the Board of Regents in 1 developing its 5-year plan, and shall be submitted to the 2 Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the 3 4 House of Representatives by January 1, 1999. 5 (2) This section shall take effect upon becoming a 6 law. 7 Section 4. Except as otherwise provided herein, this 8 act shall take effect July 1, 1999, unless repealed during the 9 1999 Regular Session of the Legislature. It is the intent of the Legislature to repeal this act in the event that: 10 11 (1) The study commissioned by the Board of Regents 12 pursuant to this act finds that the expansion of the Program 13 in Medical Sciences at Florida State University under this act would unquestionably jeopardize the accreditation of the 14 University of Florida School of Medicine; or 15 16 (2) The Legislature determines, based upon an independent analysis of cost, that the cost of the expansion 17 of the Program in Medical Sciences at Florida State University 18 19 under this act is too prohibitive, and decides to cease 20 funding of the expansion. 21 22 23 24 25 26 27 28 29 30
