Amendment to Senate Amendment (640144) (with title amendment)

On page 66, between lines 6 and 7, of the amendment insert:

Section 48. There is hereby appropriated \$350,000 from the General Revenue Fund to the Department of Education for fiscal year 1998-1999 to contract for an independent study relating to the projected enrollment growth in higher education for the next decade. The primary focus of the study shall address the following: projected enrollment in higher education for the next decade; the existing capacity in the State Community College System, the State University System, and private colleges and universities to serve additional students; and building/facility needs and financing recommendations based on enrollment projections, including recommendations as to how to maximize the use of existing facilities. In addition, the secondary focus of the study shall address policies relating to admissions of nonresidents;
