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A bill to be entitled An act relating to instructional materials; amending s. 230.23, F.S.; defining the term "adequate instructional materials" to mean providing each student with a textbook or certain other materials; amending s. 233.09, F.S.; eliminating the requirements for providing weighted and unweighted aggregations; amending s. 233.16, F.S.; changing the reference from the Department of Education to the Commissioner of Education with respect to certain duties in selecting and adopting instructional materials; eliminating a condition for rejecting bids; amending s. 233.17, F.S.; eliminating the optional escalator clause in certain contracts; amending s. 233.22, F.S.; requiring the superintendent to requisition certain materials; allowing the superintendent to requisition certain materials; amending s. 233.25, F.S.; requiring publishers and manufacturers to retain instructional materials in a depository for a specified period of time and to ensure the availability of materials; authorizing the Commissioner of Education to accept certain submissions under certain circumstances; amending s. 233.34, F.S.; requiring school districts to purchase instructional materials in core courses of subject areas within a specified time; providing exceptions; allowing school districts to make certain purchases when

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authorized in the General Appropriations Act; amending s. 233.37, F.S.; providing for the disposal of unserviceable instructional materials and those no longer on state contract; eliminating contracts between the Department of Education and recycling firms; authorizing the district school board to prescribe policies for destroying instructional materials; requiring that certain moneys be deposited in the district school fund and added to the district appropriation for instructional materials; repealing s. 233.38, F.S., relating to the exchange of textbooks by certain districts; amending s. 233.43, F.S.; requiring district school board policies to include the superintendent's responsibilities for keeping records pursuant to s. 233.46(4), F.S.; requiring reports; amending s. 233.46, F.S.; requiring policies by district school boards related to lost or damaged books; requiring a report by the Department of Education; requiring that the Executive Office of the Governor and the Secretary of State renegotiate existing contracts for certain instructional materials in core subject areas; providing an effective date. Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: Section 1. Subsection (7) of section 230.23, Florida

31 | Statutes, 1998 Supplement, is amended to read:

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230.23 Powers and duties of school board. -- The school board, acting as a board, shall exercise all powers and perform all duties listed below:

- (7) COURSES OF STUDY AND OTHER INSTRUCTIONAL AIDS.--Provide adequate instructional aids for all children as follows and in accordance with the requirements of chapter 233. For purposes of this subsection, adequate instructional materials means providing each student with a textbook or set of materials serving as the basis for instruction in the core courses of mathematics, language arts, social studies, science, reading, and literature, unless the school advisory council approves the use of a program that does not include a textbook as a major tool of instruction.
- (a) Courses of study; adoption. -- Adopt courses of study for use in the schools of the district.
- (b) Textbooks.--Provide for proper requisitioning, distribution, accounting, storage, care, and use of all textbooks and other books furnished by the state and furnish such other textbooks and library books as may be needed. The school board is responsible for assuring that instructional materials used in the district are consistent with the district goals and objectives and the curriculum frameworks approved by the State Board of Education, as well as with the state and district performance standards provided for in ss. 229.565 and 232.2454.
- (c) Other instructional aids.--Provide such other teaching accessories and aids as are needed to carry out the program.
- (d) School library media services; establishment and maintenance. -- Establish and maintain school library media 31 centers, or school library media centers open to the public,

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and, in addition thereto, such traveling or circulating libraries as may be needed for the proper operation of the district school system. Establish and maintain a program of school library media services for all public schools.

Section 2. Paragraph (f) of subsection (4) of section 233.09, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

233.09 Duties of each state instructional materials committee. -- The duties of each state instructional materials committee shall be:

- (4) EVALUATION OF INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS.--To evaluate carefully all instructional materials submitted, to ascertain which instructional materials, if any, submitted for consideration best implement the selection criteria developed by the Commissioner of Education and those curricular objectives included within applicable performance standards provided for in s. 229.565.
- (f) When recommending instructional materials for use in the schools, each committee shall have the recommendations of all districts which submit evaluations on the materials submitted for adoption in that particular subject area aggregated and presented to the members to aid them in the selection process. + however, such aggregation shall be weighted in accordance with the full-time equivalent student percentage of each district. Each committee shall prepare an additional aggregation, unweighted, with Each district recommendation shall be given equal consideration. No instructional materials shall be evaluated or recommended for adoption unless each of the district committees shall have been loaned the specified number of samples.

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1 233.16 Powers and duties of Department of Education in 2 selecting and adopting instructional materials. -- The powers 3 and duties of the Department of Education in selecting and adopting instructional materials shall be: 4 5

(2) SELECTION AND ADOPTION OF INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS. -- The Department of Education shall notify all publishers or manufacturers of instructional materials who have submitted bids that within 3 weeks after the deadline for receiving bids, at a designated time and place, it will open bids and proposals which have been submitted and deposited with the Department of Education. At the time and place designated, the bids or proposals shall be opened, read, and tabulated in the presence of the bidders or their representatives. No one may revise his or her bid after the bids have been filed. When all bids or proposals have been carefully considered, the Commissioner of Education department shall, from the list of suitable, usable, and desirable instructional materials reported by the state instructional materials committee, select and adopt instructional materials for each grade and subject field in the curriculum of public elementary and secondary schools in the state in which adoptions are made and in the subject areas designated in the advertisement, which adoption shall continue for the period specified in the advertisement, to begin on the ensuing April Such adoption shall not prevent the extension of a contract as provided in subsection (3). The Commissioner of Education department shall always reserve to itself the right to reject any and all bids or proposals if it is of the opinion that any or all bids, for any reason, should be rejected. The Commissioner of Education department may ask for 31 | new sealed bids from publishers or manufacturers whose

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instructional materials were recommended by the state instructional materials committee as suitable, usable, and desirable; specify the dates for filing such bids and the date on which they shall be opened; and proceed in all matters regarding the opening of bids and the awarding of contracts as required by the terms and provisions of this chapter. In all cases, bids or proposals shall be accompanied by a cash deposit or certified check of from \$500 to \$2,500, as the Commissioner of Education department may direct. department, in adopting instructional materials, shall give due consideration both to the prices bid for furnishing instructional materials and to the report and recommendations 12 of the state instructional materials committee. When the Commissioner of Education department has finished with the 14 report of the state instructional materials committee, the report shall be filed and preserved in the office of the Department of Education and shall be available at all times for public inspection.

Section 4. Section 233.17, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

233.17 Term of adoption for instructional materials.--

(1) The term of adoption of any instructional materials must be an 8-year period beginning on April 1 following the adoption, except for the core subject areas which include mathematics, science, social studies, reading, and literature which shall be for a term not to exceed 6 years beginning on April 1 following the adoption. Any contract for instructional materials may be extended as prescribed in s. 233.16(2). The Commissioner of Education may approve terms of adoption of less than 8 years for materials in content areas which require more frequent revision.

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doption for 4 or more years shall provide that a publisher or manufacturer of instructional materials may, at the end of the third year during the term of the contract, upon giving 60 days' notification, increase such contract price to the publisher's or manufacturer's then-current lowest wholesale price at which the materials are then being offered to any state or school district in the United States, except that such adjustment shall not exceed the percentage by which the consumer price index as determined by the United States

Department of Labor has increased during the time the contract has been in force. Such price increase shall remain in effect for the remaining term of the contract, unless the contract price is increased as permitted above.

(2) The department shall publish annually an official schedule of subject areas to be called for adoption for each of the succeeding 2 years, and a tentative schedule for years 3, 4, 5, and 6. If extenuating circumstances warrant, the Commissioner of Education may order the department to add one or more subject areas to the official schedule, in which event the commissioner shall develop criteria for such additional subject area or areas pursuant to s. 229.512(15) and make them available to publishers as soon as practicable. Notwithstanding the provisions of s. 229.512(15), the criteria for such additional subject area or areas may be provided to publishers less than 24 months before the date on which bids are due. The schedule shall be developed so as to promote balance among the subject areas so that the required expenditure for new instructional materials is approximately the same each year in order to maintain curricular consistency.

Section 233.22, Florida Statutes, is 2 amended to read: 3 233.22 Requisition of instructional materials from 4 publisher's depository .--5 (1) The superintendent shall requisition adopted 6 instructional materials from the depository of the publisher 7 with whom a contract has been made. However, the 8 superintendent shall requisition current instructional materials to provide each student with a textbook or other 9 10 materials as a major tool of instruction in core courses of 11 the subject areas in s. 233.34(2). These materials must be requisitioned within the first 2 years of the adoption cycle, 12 13 except for instructional materials related to growth of 14 student membership or instructional-materials-maintenance 15 needs. The superintendent may requisition instructional materials in the core subject areas in s. 233.34(2) that are 16 17 related to growth of student membership or 18 instructional-materials-maintenance needs during the 3rd, 4th, 19 5th, and 6th years of the original contract period. 20 (2) The superintendent shall verify that such requisition is complete and accurate and order the depository 21 to forward to him or her the adopted instructional materials 22 shown by the requisition. The depository shall prepare an 23 24 invoice of the materials shipped, including shipping charges, 25 and mail it to the superintendent to whom the shipment is being made. The superintendent shall pay the depository within 26 60 days after receipt of the requisitioned materials from the 27 28 appropriation for the purchase of adopted instructional 29 materials. 30 Section 6. - 233.25 Duties, responsibilities, and requirements of publishers and manufacturers of instructional materials.--Publishers and manufacturers of instructional materials, or their representatives, shall:
- (8) Provide any instructional materials free of charge in the state to the same extent as that received by any state or school district in the United States. The commissioner may accept submissions that reflect a charge for ancillary materials provided free of charge in other states' contracts if the publisher can reduce the total program cost to Florida school districts.
- (12) Maintain, or contract with, a depository in the state and maintain there an inventory sufficient to receive and fill orders for instructional materials.
- (13) For the core subject areas in s. 233.34(2), maintain in the depository for the first 2 years of the contract an inventory of instructional materials that is sufficient to receive and fill orders.
- (14) For the core subject areas in s. 233.34(2), ensure the availability of an inventory sufficient to receive and fill orders for instructional materials for growth, including the opening of a new school, and replacement during the 3rd, 4th, 5th, and 6th years of the original contract period.
- (15) For all other subject areas, maintain in the depository an inventory of instructional materials that is sufficient to receive and fill orders.

Section 233.34, Florida Statutes, is 2 amended to read: 3 233.34 Use of instructional materials allocation; instructional materials, library books, and reference books; 4 5 repair of books; exceptions .--6 (1) On or before July 1 each year, the commissioner 7 shall certify to the superintendent of each district the estimated allocation of state funds for instructional 9 materials, computed pursuant to the provisions of chapter 236 10 for the ensuing fiscal year. 11 (2)(a) Each school district must purchase current instructional materials to provide each student with a 12 textbook or other instructional materials as a major tool of 13 instruction in core courses of the subject areas of 14 mathematics, language arts, science, social studies, reading, 15 and literature for kindergarten through grade 12. - (b) However, up to 50 percent of the annual allocation may be used for the purchase of instructional materials, including library and reference books and nonprint materials, not included on the state-adopted list and for the repair and renovation of textbooks and library books.
- (c) Notwithstanding the provisions of this subsection, school districts may use 100 percent of that portion of the annual allocation which is designated by the district for the purchase of instructional materials for kindergarten, and 75 percent of that portion of the annual allocation which is designated for the purchase of instructional materials for first grade, to purchase materials not on the state-adopted list.
- (4) (3) Notwithstanding the definition of instructional materials in s. 233.07(4), the funds described in subsection (3)<del>(2)</del>which school districts may use to purchase materials not on the state adopted list may be used for the purchase of instructional materials or other items having intellectual content which assist in the instruction of a subject or course. These items may be available in bound, unbound, kit, or package form and may consist of hardbacked or softbacked textbooks, replacements for items which were part of 31 previously purchased instructional materials, consumables,

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learning laboratories, manipulatives, electronic media, computer courseware or software, and other commonly accepted instructional tools as prescribed by school board policy. The funds available to school districts for the purchase of materials not on the state adopted list may not be used to purchase electronic or computer hardware even if such hardware is bundled with software or other electronic media, nor may such funds be used to purchase equipment or supplies. However, when authorized to do so in the General Appropriations Act, a school or school district may use a portion of the funds available to it for the purchase of materials not on the state adopted list to purchase science laboratory materials and supplies.

(5)<del>(4)</del> Each district school board shall adopt policies, and each superintendent shall implement procedures, that will assure the maximum use by the students of the materials herein authorized.

(6)<del>(5)</del> District school boards are authorized to issue purchase orders subsequent to March 15 in an aggregate amount which does not exceed 20 percent of the current year's allocation, and subsequent to May 1 in an aggregate amount which does not exceed 90 percent of the current year's allocation, for the purpose of expediting the delivery of instructional materials which are to be paid for from the ensuing year's allocation.

(7) In any year in which the total allocation for a district has not been expended or obligated prior to June 30, the district shall carry forward such unobligated amount and shall add this amount to the next year's allocation.

Section 233.43, Florida Statutes, is 2 amended to read: 3 233.43 Duties of superintendent relating to instructional materials. -- The duties and responsibilities of 4 5 each superintendent for the requisition, purchase, receipt, 6 storage, distribution, use, conservation, records, and reports 7 of, and management practices and property accountability 8 concerning, instructional materials shall be prescribed by 9 policies of the district school board. Such policies shall 10 also provide for an evaluation of any instructional materials 11 to be requisitioned that have not been used previously in the schools of the district. 1	STATEMENT OF SUBSTANTIAL CHANGES CONTAINED IN
2	COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR <u>SB 1006</u>
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4	The committee substitute amends s. 233.37, F.S., to allow district school boards to prescribe policy, rather than adopt
5	rules, for the disposal of instructional materials. The bill removes the requirements for weighting district
6	recommendations in the selection process for instructional materials and requires each district recommendation to be
7	given equal consideration. The references to the Department of Education are replaced with references to the Commissioner of
8	Education in certain provisions of s. 233.16, F.S., that relate to the selection and adoption of instructional
9	materials. The committee substitute also removes a condition for rejecting bids.
10	The committee substitute removes the provision in s. 233.17,
11	F.S., that requires contracts placing instructional materials on adoption for 4 or more years to have an adjusted price
12	increase. The Commissioner of Education is authorized in s. 233.25, F.S., to accept submissions of bids or proposals that
13	reflect a charge for ancillary materials provided free of charge in other states' contracts if the publisher can reduce
14 15	the total program cost to Florida school districts.  Under new provisions of s. 233.34, F.S., each school district
16	must buy current instructional materials to provide each student with a textbook or other instructional materials as a
17	major tool of instruction in the core courses of specified subject areas for kindergarten through grade 12. The purchase
18	must be made within the first 2 years of the effective date of the adoption cycle. The school superintendent must obtain
19	current instructional materials to provide each student with a textbook or other materials as a major tool of instruction in
20	core courses in the designated subject areas. The materials must be obtained within the first 2 years of the adoption
21	cycle, except for materials related to growth and maintenance.
22	The committee substitute removes the restriction on the use of state funds for instructional materials and eliminates the
23	required report to the Legislature, as well as the references to specific contracts. The option is removed for the
24	districts with waivers to participate in the incentive provisions of the bill. The committee substitute defines
25	adequate instructional materials in s. 230.23, F.S. Finally, the committee substitute corrects a technical reference
26	related to the use of the instructional materials allocation.
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
