A bill to be entitled An act relating to public school technical academy pilot projects; establishing public school technical academy pilot projects; providing for incentive grants; providing student eligibility requirements; providing graduation requirements; requiring the development and adoption of rules; amending s. 229.57, F.S.; requiring students eligible for enrollment in a public school technical academy to be provided an opportunity to take the high school competency test, upon request; requiring an appropriation; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Public school technical academy pilot projects.--

(1) ESTABLISHMENT.--From funding provided in the General Appropriations Act, the Department of Education shall award incentive grants to public school districts to establish and operate technical academy pilot projects. Public school technical academies will offer 2-year technology-based programs including, but not limited to, performing arts programs, fine arts programs, computer and applied technology programs, and vocational job-preparatory programs, in which an eligible student may enroll during grades 11 and 12. Programs offered by technical academies should operate in cooperation with existing certificate career education programs, when applicable.

- (2) STUDENT ELIGIBILITY.--To be eligible to enroll in a public school technical academy a student must be entering the eleventh grade and must have:
- (a) Passed all sections of the high school competency test; and
- (b) Completed the tenth grade with a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or higher on a 4.0 scale, or its equivalent, in courses required for graduation.
 - (3) GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS. --
- (a) While enrolled in a public school technical academy, a student shall be exempt from the requirements of 232.246(1) regarding courses required for graduation.
- (b) Upon successful completion of a course of study at a public school technical academy, a student will be awarded a differentiated diploma indicating graduation from a public school technical academy in a form prescribed by the State Board of Education.
- (4) RULES.--The state board shall adopt rules as necessary to implement this section, including rules developed by the Department of Education establishing graduation requirements for public school technical academies that are as rigorous as or more rigorous than gradation requirements for receipt of a standard high school diploma.
- (5) FUNDING.--There is hereby appropriated from the General Revenue Fund to the Department of Education the sum of \$5 million for incentive grants for the establishment and operation of public school technical academy pilot projects.
- Section 2. Paragraph (c) of subsection (3) of section 229.57, Florida Statutes, 1998 Supplement, is amended to read: 229.57 Student assessment program.--

- (3) STATEWIDE ASSESSMENT PROGRAM.—The commissioner is directed to design and implement a statewide program of educational assessment that provides information for the improvement of the operation and management of the public schools. The program must be designed, as far as possible, so as not to conflict with ongoing district assessment programs and so as to use information obtained from district programs. Pursuant to the statewide assessment program, the commissioner shall:
- (c) Develop and implement a student achievement testing program as part of the statewide assessment program, to be administered at designated times at the elementary, middle, and high school levels to measure reading, writing, and mathematics. The testing program must be designed so that:
- 1. The tests measure student skills and competencies adopted by the state board as specified in paragraph (a). The tests must measure and report student proficiency levels in reading, writing, and mathematics. Other content areas may be included as directed by the commissioner. The commissioner shall provide for the tests to be developed or obtained, as appropriate, through contracts and project agreements with private vendors, public vendors, public agencies, postsecondary institutions, or school districts. The commissioner shall obtain input with respect to the design and implementation of the testing program from state educators and the public.
- 2. The tests are criterion-referenced and include, to the extent determined by the commissioner, items that require the student to produce information or perform tasks in such a

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way that the skills and competencies he or she uses can be measured.

- Each testing program, whether at the elementary, middle, or high school level, includes a test of writing in which students are required to produce writings which are then scored by appropriate methods.
- 4. A score is designated for each subject area tested, below which score a student's performance is deemed inadequate. The school districts shall provide appropriate remedial instruction to students who score below these levels.
- 5. All 11th grade students take a high school competency test developed by the state board to test minimum student performance skills and competencies in reading, writing, and mathematics. The test must be based on the skills and competencies adopted by the state board pursuant to paragraph (a). Upon recommendation of the commissioner, the state board shall designate a passing score for each part of the high school competency test. In establishing passing scores, the state board shall consider any possible negative impact of the test on minority students. The commissioner may establish criteria whereby a student who successfully demonstrates proficiency in either reading or mathematics or both may be exempted from taking the corresponding section of the high school competency test or the college placement test. Each student determined to be potentially eligible for enrollment in a public school technical academy shall be provided an opportunity to take the high school competency test at the end of his or her tenth grade year before enrollment in the eleventh grade, upon request. A student must earn a passing score or have been exempted from each part of 31 the high school competency test in order to qualify for a

regular high school diploma. The school districts shall provide appropriate remedial instruction to students who do not pass part of the competency test.

- 6. Participation in the testing program is mandatory for all students, except as otherwise prescribed by the commissioner. The commissioner shall recommend rules to the state board for the provision of test adaptations and modifications of procedures as necessary for students in exceptional education programs and for students who have limited English proficiency.
- 7. A student seeking an adult high school diploma must meet the same testing requirements that a regular high school student must meet.

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The commissioner may design and implement student testing programs for any grade level and subject area, based on procedures designated by the commissioner to monitor educational achievement in the state.

- (d) Obtain or develop a career planning assessment to be administered to students, at their option, in grades 7 and 10 to assist them in preparing for further education or entering the workforce. The statewide student assessment program must include career planning assessment.
- (e) Conduct ongoing research to develop improved methods of assessing student performance, including, without limitation, the use of technology to administer tests, the use of electronic transfer of data, the development of work-product assessments, and the development of process assessments.
- (f) Conduct ongoing research and analysis of student 31 achievement data, including, without limitation, monitoring

trends in student achievement, identifying school programs that are successful, and analyzing correlates of school achievement. (g) Provide technical assistance to school districts in the implementation of state and district testing programs and the use of the data produced pursuant to such programs. Section 3.
