Subsection (2) of section 125.35, Florida 23 Statutes, is amended to read: 125.35 County authorized to sell real and personal 24 25 property and to lease real property.--(2) When the board of county commissioners finds that 26 27 a parcel of real property is of insufficient size and shape to 28 be issued a building permit for any type of development to be constructed on the property or when the board of county 29 30 commissioners finds that the value of a parcel of real 31 property is\$10,000\$5,000 or less, as determined by a fee 1

appraiser designated by the board or as determined by the 1 county property appraiser, and when, due to the size, shape, 2 3 location, and value of the parcel, it is determined by the 4 board that the parcel is of use only to one or more adjacent 5 property owners, the board may effect a private sale of the б parcel. The board may, after sending notice of its intended 7 action to owners of adjacent property by certified mail, effect a sale and conveyance of the parcel at private sale 8 9 without receiving bids or publishing notice; however, if, 10 within 10 working days after receiving such mailed notice, two 11 or more owners of adjacent property notify the board of their desire to purchase the parcel, the board shall accept sealed 12 13 bids for the parcel from such property owners and may convey 14 such parcel to the highest bidder or may reject all offers.

15 Section 2. Section 197.482, Florida Statutes, is 16 amended to read:

17 197.482 Limitation upon lien of tax certificate.--(1) After the expiration of 4 7 years from the date of 18 19 issuance of a tax certificate, if a tax deed has not been 20 applied for on the property covered by the certificate, and no other administrative or legal proceeding has existed of 21 record, the tax certificate is null and void, and the tax 22 collector shall cancel the tax certificate, noting the date of 23 24 the cancellation of the tax certificate upon all appropriate records in his or her office. The tax collector shall 25 complete the cancellation by entering opposite the record of 26 the 4-year-old 7-year-old tax certificate a notation in 27 28 substantially the following form: "Canceled by Act of 1973 29 Florida Legislature." All certificates outstanding July 1, 1973, shall have a life of 20 years from the date of issue. 30 31

Subsection (1) of section 197.502, Florida 8 9 Statutes, is amended to read: 10 197.502 Application for obtaining tax deed by holder 11 of tax sale certificate; fees.--(1) The holder of any tax certificate, other than the 12 county, at any time after 1 year has 2 years have elapsed 13 since April 1 of the year of issuance of the tax certificate 14 15 and before the expiration of 47 years from the date of issuance, may file the certificate and an application for a 16 17 tax deed with the tax collector of the county where the lands 18 described in the certificate are located. Upon application for a tax deed, the county 4 5 shall deposit with the tax collector all applicable costs and б fees, but shall not deposit any money to cover the redemption 7 of other outstanding certificates covering the land. 8 Section 5. Subsection (7) of section 197.502, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 9 10 197.502 Application for obtaining tax deed by holder 11 of tax sale certificate; fees.--(7) If there are no bidders at the public sale, the 12 clerk shall enter the land on a list entitled "lands available 13 for taxes" and shall immediately notify the county commission 14 and all other persons holding certificates against the land 15 that the land is available. previously sold, acquired for infill housing, or dedicated by 1 2 the board of county commissioners, which the board of county 3 commissioners has determined are not to be conveyed to the 4 record fee simple owner in accordance with the provisions of subsections (1) and (2), and which are located within the 5 б boundaries of an incorporated municipality of the county shall 7 be conveyed to the governing board of the municipality in which the land is located. This act shall take effect upon becoming a 13 14 law, and sections 2, 3, 4, and 6 apply only to tax 15 certificates issued after May 15, 1999. 16 17 SENATE SUMMARY 18 Authorizes counties to sell properties of an insufficient size and shape to be permitted or valued less than \$10,000. Provides that a tax certificate becomes void within 4 years from the date of issuance of the tax certificate if a tax deed has not been applied for on property subject to the certificate. Provides that the holder of a tax certificate other than a county must apply for a tax deed before the expiration of 4 years from the date of issuance of the tax certificate. Provides that an application by a county for obtaining a tax deed must be made within 1 year after April 1 of the year of issuance of the tax certificates. Provides for cancellation of owed taxes when the county or other 19 20 21 22 23 24 cancellation of owed taxes when the county or other governmental unit purchases land for its own use or for 25 infill housing.
