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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Families First program. --

(1) CREATION.--There is hereby created the Families

First program for first-time parents and their newborns. This

program is a primary prevention approach that offers a

postdelivery birth facility visit, a home visit, and linkages

to family supports for families and their newborns. The goal

of the program is to reinforce parenting skills in order to

improve normal child development and child health outcomes.

This service delivery approach must be community-based,

collaborative, and nonduplicative with the intent of

integrating and coordinating services with Florida's Healthy

Start Initiative, Healthy Families Florida, and other home

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visiting and family support service delivery systems already in place in communities.

- (2) EXPECTED OUTCOMES. -- The Families First program is designed to increase newborn care skills, to promote normal child development, to improve rates of initiation of immunizations and well-child-care utilization, to impart information regarding planning for future pregnancies, and to reduce unintentional injuries.
- (3) CRITICAL ELEMENTS. -- This program shall provide home visiting using a nurse provider model. The Families First program must:
- (a) Begin with one postdelivery birth facility visit and include one followup home visit within 14 days after delivery.
 - (b) Provide visits with the consent of families.
- (c) Offer information regarding available community services ranging from minimum basic information to ongoing services of an intensity and duration to meet the needs of families and their newborns.
 - (d) Provide culturally competent services.
- (e) Provide services that focus on supporting the parent as well as supporting parent-child interaction and normal child development for all children in the family.
- (f) Link families to medical providers to ensure optimal health and development, including timely immunizations, well-child care that includes developmental assessment and is consistent with the standards and periodicity schedule recommended by the American Academy of Pediatrics. If eligible for Medicaid, children are referred for Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis, and Treatment 31 (EPSDT) now known as Child Health Check-Up.

- (g) Select home visiting nurses because of their interpersonal skills, their knowledge of community resources, their willingness to work in or their experience working with culturally diverse communities and families, and their job skills.
- (h) Ensure that home visiting nurses have core service delivery competencies in areas such as: cultural diversity, substance abuse, child abuse, domestic violence, parent-child interaction models, normal child development, substance-exposed infants and children, and health and social services in their community.
- (i) Ensure that home visiting nurses have preservice and ongoing training specific to their role and have supervision for assurance of quality and coordination with other home visiting programs.
- (4) SPECIAL CONSIDERATIONS.--The Families First program shall incorporate: referral to specialized services to accommodate for the needs of substance abusing families; referral for ongoing risk reduction services for families with risk factors that make them eligible for Healthy Start or Healthy Families Florida; referral for other needs as appropriate; and phone numbers to call for further assistance.
- develop, implement, and administer a single-site demonstration project for the Families First program by choosing a collaborative site. Preference shall be given to a site with a federal home visiting program or which has secured grant funds to target the home visiting needs of newborns and their families. The department shall:
- 30 <u>(a) Work jointly with the Agency for Health Care</u>
 31 Administration to seek a federal waiver to secure matching

funds under Title XIX of the Social Security Act (Medicaid)
for the Families First program. The federal waiver
application shall include allowance to use new and existing
general revenue and local contributions. Families First
program services are not to be considered an entitlement under
this waiver.

- (b) Implement the Families First program using the criteria provided in this section.
- (c) Implement the Families First program in collaboration with local Healthy Start coalitions, Healthy Families Florida, and family preservation and support planning entities.
- (6) The Families First program shall include the following criteria for implementation:
- (a) The program shall be integrated with Healthy Start and other home visiting and family support programs.
- (b) The program shall provide outcome and performance data on the number of births, the number of families served, the number of visits provided, the number of families refusing visits, the relationship with other community home visiting providers, and key health outcomes for the community to include immunization initiation rates, injury rates, SIDS deaths and other infant mortality rates, and other information that the program deems to have been affected by the program.
- (c) Services provided include a brief assessment of strengths and needs, encouraging linkage to other risk-reduction services as appropriate, anticipatory guidance, and information on a range of topics, including brain development, infant care, sleep position, child care provider selection, parent-child interaction, home safety, and other supportive skills.

1	(d) The department shall link with other statewide
2	home visiting evaluation projects to assess the demonstration
3	project, using the outcome and process data collected by the
4	project.
5	(e) Quality assurance and performance improvement must
6	be an integral part of the local program.
7	(7) Subject to specific appropriation, the Families
8	First demonstration project shall be implemented beginning
9	January 1, 2000. No part of this act shall be implemented
10	unless funding is appropriated therefor.
11	Section 2. This act shall take effect upon becoming a
12	law.
