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           Section 1. Present paragraphs (d) through (k) of
    subsection (3) of section 230.2305, Florida Statutes, are
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    redesignated as paragraphs (e) through (1), respectively, and
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    a new paragraph (d) is added to that section, to read:
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           230.2305 Prekindergarten early intervention program.--
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           (3) STANDARDS.--
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          (d) The program curriculum may include music therapy
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    services for the purpose of maximizing individual potential
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    and preventing developmental delays.
           Section 2. Subsection (4) of section 391.305, Florida
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    Statutes, 1998 Supplement, is amended to read:
           391.305 Program standards; rules.--The Department of

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           (2) Prevention services provided by the developmental
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    services program include services to high-risk and
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    developmentally disabled children from birth to 5 years of
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    age, and their families, to meet the intent of chapter 411.
    Such services shall include individual evaluations or
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   assessments necessary to diagnose a developmental disability
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1 or high-risk condition and to determine appropriate individual family and support services, unless evaluations or assessments 2 3 are the responsibility of the children's medical services program for children ages birth to 3 years eligible for 4 5 services under this chapter or part H of the Individuals with б Disabilities Education Act, and may include: 7 (a) Early intervention services, including 8 developmental training, and specialized therapies, and music therapy services for the purpose of maximizing individual 9 10 potential and preventing further developmental delays. Early 11 intervention services, which are the responsibility of the children's medical services program for children ages birth to 12 13 3 years who are eligible for services under this chapter or under part H of the Individuals with Disabilities Education 14 Act, shall not be provided through the developmental services 15 program unless funding is specifically appropriated to the 16 17 developmental services program for this purpose. 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1 (4) Community-based services shall, to the extent of 2 available resources, include: 3 (p) Music therapy services for infants and toddlers, 4 for the purpose of maximizing individual potential and 5 preventing further developmental delays. б 7 Services to clients with spina bifida shall not include 8 medical services except as appropriated by the Legislature. Section 5. Section 402.25, Florida Statutes, 1998 9 10 Supplement, is amended to read: 11 402.25 Infants and toddlers in state-funded education and care programs; brain development activities.--Each 12 13 state-funded education and care program for children from birth to 5 years of age must provide activities to foster 14 brain development in infants and toddlers. A program must 15 provide an environment rich in language and music and filled 16 17 with objects of various colors, shapes, textures, and sizes to stimulate visual, tactile, auditory, and linguistic senses in 18 19 the children and must include classical music and may include 20 music therapy for the purpose of maximizing individual potential and preventing developmental delays, and at least 30 21 minutes of reading to the children each day. A program may be 22 offered through an existing early childhood program such as 23 24 Healthy Start, the Title I program, contracted or directly operated subsidized child care, the prekindergarten early 25 intervention program, Florida First Start, the Head Start 26 program, or a private child care program. A program must 27 28 provide training for the infants' and toddlers' parents 29 including direct dialogue and interaction between teachers and parents demonstrating the urgency of brain development in the 30 31

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1 first year of a child's life. Family day care centers are 2 encouraged, but not required, to comply with this section. 3 Section 6. Section 411.203, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 4 5 411.203 Continuum of comprehensive services.--The 6 Department of Education, the Department of Health, and the 7 Department of Children and Family Health and Rehabilitative 8 Services shall utilize the continuum of prevention and early 9 assistance services for high-risk pregnant women and for 10 high-risk and handicapped children and their families, as 11 outlined in this section, as a basis for the intraagency and interagency program coordination, monitoring, and analysis 12 13 required in this chapter. The continuum shall be the quide for the comprehensive statewide approach for services for 14 high-risk pregnant women and for high-risk and handicapped 15 children and their families, and may be expanded or reduced as 16 17 necessary for the enhancement of those services. Expansion or reduction of the continuum shall be determined by intraagency 18 19 or interagency findings and agreement, whichever is applicable. Implementation of the continuum shall be based 20 upon applicable eligibility criteria, availability of 21 resources, and interagency prioritization when programs impact 22 both agencies, or upon single agency prioritization when 23 24 programs impact only one agency. (h) A new mother information program at the birth 12 13 site, to provide an informational brochure about immunizations, normal child development, abuse avoidance and 14 15 appropriate parenting strategies, family planning, and community resources and support services for all parents of 16 17 newborns and to schedule Medicaid-eligible infants for a health checkup. 18 19 (i) Appropriate screenings, to include, but not be limited to, metabolic screening, sickle-cell screening, 20 21 hearing screening, developmental screening, and categorical 22 screening. 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(6) RULES FOR IMPLEMENTATION. -- The Department of Children and Family Health and Rehabilitative Services shall adopt rules necessary to implement this section. Section 8. This act shall take effect October 1, 1999. STATEMENT OF SUBSTANTIAL CHANGES CONTAINED IN COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR Senate Bill 2120 б Allowing, rather than requiring, music therapy in the prekindergarten early intervention program and in the brain development activities for infants and toddlers. Requires the interagency continuum of comprehensive services be coordinated by the Departments of Education, Health, and Children and Family Services.
