## I. SUMMARY:

This bill creates the Juvenile Welfare Trust Fund in the Department of Juvenile Justice for the benefit of juveniles in its custody.

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# II. SUBSTANTIVE ANALYSIS:

### A. PRESENT SITUATION:

The Department of Juvenile Justice is utilizing the statutory authority granted in s. 402.18, Florida Statutes, to purchase shoes, books, and other personal items for juveniles in the custody of the department. Continued use of the authority of s. 402.18, F.S., is problematic since that section applies to the Department of Children and Family Services.

### B. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

The Juvenile Welfare Trust Fund created by this bill would enable the Department of Juvenile Justice to no longer use a similar trust fund in the Department of Children and Family Services. It would allow the Department of Juvenile Justice to spend funds accruing to the Department from the sale of goods from vending machines, canteens, the operation of hobby shops, activity centers, farming projects, and other such facilities for the benefit of juveniles in its custody.
