# I. SUMMARY:

This bill creates the University of South Florida Health Support Trust Fund, to be administered by the State University System. This new fund is needed to account for funds received from cigarette tax revenues paid to the Board of Directors of the H. Lee Moffitt Cancer Center and Research Institute as provided in chapter 98-286, Laws of Florida, and from the Tobacco Settlement Trust Fund as provided in chapter 98-307, Laws of Florida.

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# II. SUBSTANTIVE ANALYSIS:

#### A. PRESENT SITUATION:

This bill creates the University of South Florida Health Support Trust Fund to be administered by the State University System. This new fund is needed to account for funds received from cigarette tax revenues paid to the Board of Directors of the H. Lee Moffitt Cancer Center and Research Institute as provided in Chapter 98-286, LOF, and from Tobacco Settlement Trust Fund as provided in Chapter 98-307, LOF. Currently, these revenues are being deposited into the student fee trust fund; this fund segregates the revenues from the cigarette tax and from the Tobacco Settlement Trust Fund so they are not comingled with student fees.

# B. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

This bill creates a new trust fund - the University of South Florida Health Support Trust Fund administered by the State University System - to account for the spending of moneys received from cigarette tax revenues and the Tobacco Settlement Trust Fund.
