1	(1) FINDINGSThe Legislature finds that: major
2	changes and improvements have occurred in how mental health
3	and substance abuse care services are planned, purchased,
4	delivered, coordinated, and accounted for; the management of
5	the state's substance abuse and mental health services system
6	delineated in part IV of chapter 394, Florida Statutes, has
7	not been systematically reviewed and updated in over 15 years;
8	and the management of the state-supported mental health and
9	substance abuse system has not kept pace with improvements in
10	the field, thereby diminishing the potential efficacy of its
11	investment in mental health services and substance abuse
12	services. Therefore, it is the intent of the Legislature that
13	a systematic review of the overall management of the state's
14	mental health and substance abuse system be conducted and that
15	recommendations for updating part IV of chapter 394, Florida
16	Statutes, and other related statutes be formulated.
17	(2) CREATIONThere is created, within the Executive
18	Office of the Governor, the Commission on Mental Health and
19	Substance Abuse.
20	(3) DUTIESThe duties of the Commission on Mental
21	Health and Substance Abuse include the following:
22	(a) Conducting a review and evaluation of the

STATEMENT OF SUBSTANTIAL CHANGES CONTAINED IN COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR Senate Bills 2388 and 1946 SB 2388 Removes the provision that unit cost contracting is effective through June 30, 2000. б Includes provisions for the department to propose statutory revisions to chapter 394, part IV, F.S., no later than October 1, 2000. Creates the Commission on Mental Health and Substance Abuse and specifies its membership and duties. SB 1946 Removes the provision that unit cost contracting is effective through June 30, 2000. Deletes the provision that the Department of Children and Family Services propose statutory revisions to part IV of Chapter 394, F.S., by December 1, 1999. Creates the Commission on Mental Health and Substance Abuse and specifies its membership and duties.
