# I. SUMMARY:

House Bill 365 requires school boards, to install, if they choose, a character-development program which is the same as or similar to Character Counts or Character First! Education Series, in elementary schools. The program must be secular in nature and must stress such character qualities as attentiveness, patience, and initiative.

## A. PRESENT SITUATION:

233.0612, F.S., Authorized Instruction.

Each school district may provide students with programs and instruction at the appropriate grade levels in areas including, but not limited to, the following:

- Character development and law education;
- The objective study of the Bible and religion;
- Traffic education;
- ◆ Free enterprise and consumer education;
- Programs to encourage patriotism and greater respect for country;
- Drug abuse resistance education;
- ◆ Comprehensive health education;
- Care of nursing home patients;
- Instruction in acquired immune deficiency syndrome;
- Voting instruction, including the use of county voting machines; and
- Before-school and after-school programs.

School boards are encouraged to install in the elementary schools of the district a program in character development which is the same or similar to the Character Counts or Character First! Education Series. The program must be secular in nature and stress such character qualities as attentiveness, patience, and initiative.

Within the state of Florida more than 171 schools have inquired about the use of character development programs. School districts have spent more than \$20,000 on program materials for the development of character education implementation. There are more than 21 states involved in Character Education Partnership programs. In the past three (3) years more than \$4,951,287 has been spent on character education programs in the nation.

Additional character education teacher training programs designed for special needs and physically challenged students are now in the development stages. Character Counts! Education Series has completed the character education parent component called, "Parent Preview." The cost for this series has not been determined. The projected time for the new series to become available to school districts is August 1999. The Character Counts! Education Series program cost is \$5 - \$7 per student. Teacher training cost is included in the per student cost. If a new character quality is introduced every month, the approximate cost for a school of five hundred would be \$2,500 to \$3,500 for the entire year.

If a school board chooses to provide character development education they must install in the elementary schools, a program which is the same as or similar to the Character Counts or Character First! Education Series.
