Section 1. Any provider that furnishes foster care under a contract with the Department of Children and Family Services is deemed to be a corporation acting primarily as an instrumentality of the state, and the limitations on tort actions contained in section 768.28, Florida Statutes, shall apply to any action brought against the provider with respect to such foster care services if the provider is acting within the scope of and pursuant to guidelines established in the contract or by rule of the Department of Children and Family Services. A contract must provide for the indemnification of the state by the provider for any liabilities that may be incurred by the state due to negligence of the provider, up to the limits established under section 768.28, Florida Statutes, in addition to all defense costs incurred by the state. Section 2. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law.

SENATE SUMMARY Provides that a foster-care provider acting under a contract with the Department of Children and Family Services is an instrumentality of the state for purposes of the waiver of sovereign immunity in tort actions. Provides for certain limitations to apply with respect to any such tort action if the provider is acting within the scope of the contract and rules of the department. Requires that the contract provide for indemnification of the state for certain liabilities and defense costs incurred by the state incurred by the state.
