2 3 Section 1. Institutes of Excellence in Infant and 4 Toddler Development. --5 (1) The Legislature recognizes the importance of 6 preschool developmental education for children from birth to 7 kindergarten age. Therefore, the Legislature authorizes 8 community colleges and public or private colleges and 9 universities to establish Institutes of Excellence in Infant and Toddler Development. Initiatives of Institutes of 10 11 Excellence are to be consistent with legislative initiatives 12 relating to school readiness, address specific concerns of 13 children from birth to age 3, and link directly with other 14 efforts in the community, including Head Start, Healthy Start and Healthy Families, subsidized child care, and Caring for 15 Kids. Legislative funding will enable institutes to serve as 16 model demonstration and resource development programs in the 17 community for the development of professional child care 18 19 providers and for the enhancement of knowledge on the part of 20 providers, related professionals and parents regarding the development of children from birth to age 3. 21 (2) Institutes of Excellence in Infant and Toddler 22

Institutes of Excellence established at community colleges which have established child development training centers, pursuant to 240.382, should be created as part of that center. Institutes of Excellence may be established by community colleges or public or private colleges or universities in cooperation with an institution which has established a child development training center according to 240.382.

- (3) Institutes of Excellence shall perform the
 following functions:
- (a) Outreach efforts, including support for infant and toddler specialists in the child care coordinating agencies and other existing community training and technical assistance programs who provide services to child care providers and parents, and the development of marketing and outreach materials for trainers, parents, and child care and related professionals. An institute may also provide leadership training in conjunction with the Caring for Kids program to promote quality initiatives, such as accreditation of centers and family day care homes serving children from birth to age 5.
- (b) Development and implementation of observation and demonstration sites at the community college or university.

 Such sites shall be used:

- 1. By the community, including other child care providers, training providers, and parents, for observations of a model quality child care environment.
- 2. By related providers to provide quality health care services, including critical screening for auditory, visual, and other physical impairments that can impede healthy brain development.
- 3. As sites to implement efforts that identify early language acquisition difficulties in infants and toddlers, and that target interventions for improving early language development.
- (c) Development and support of specialized training courses, systems, and programs in the area of infant and toddler development from birth to age 3 which include articulation mechanisms to ensure and promote career ladder within the educational institution and among other institutions. Such training shall:
- 1. Be provided for a wide range of existing and potential child care workers, including economically disadvantaged citizens.
- 2. Be established as a mechanism to increase the professional stature of those working in the child care arena.
- 3. Provide leadership development for child care center directors.
- 4. Include coordinated development and implementation of distance learning instruction, to provide continuing education for family providers and parents in their homes or in centrally located sites such as public libraries or child care coordinating agencies.
- 30 (4) Funding shall be included annually in the General
 31 Appropriations Act to provide grants for those Institutes of

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Excellence specifically authorized by the Legislature to be established. Funding for Institutes of Excellence that are created as part of child development training centers is not to supplant funding provided according to 240.382 or to be used for operational costs or facilities currently funded through that section.

The Articulation Coordinating Committee shall, after completing this assessment, recommend rules that will provide for credit to be awarded to those who enroll in and complete courses offered by both private and public providers of early childhood instruction, including instruction that addresses the minimum training requirements for employment in the child care field and for attainment of the child development associate credential, or its equivalent. Such recommendations shall also provide for articulation of vocational credit to college credit, and articulation of credits earned in an associate in science degree program, or an associate in arts specialization course to credit in a

baccalaureate degree program. The Commissioner of Education shall implement the recommendations of the Articulation Coordinating Committee through rules adopted by the State Board of Education.
