I. SUMMARY:

HB 909 requires instruction in parenting skills to be included in the one-half credit in life management skills required for graduation from high school.

The bill has no fiscal impact to the State.

The effective date of the bill is July 1, 1999.

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II. SUBSTANTIVE ANALYSIS:

A. PRESENT SITUATION:

General Requirements for High School Graduation

Currently, the minimum requirements for high school graduation include the following:

- passage of both sections of the High School Competency Test (HSCT);
- completion of a minimum of 24 credits;
- receipt of the required grade point average (GPA) for graduation. Students who enter the 9th grade during the 1997-98 school year must have a 2.0 cumulative GPA on a 4.0 scale in the courses that apply to the credits required for high school graduation. Students who entered the 9th grade prior to 1997-98 must earn a 2.0 GPA on a 4.0 scale for courses required for high school graduation which are taken after July 1, 1997; or maintain an overall cumulative GPA of 2.0 including all high school courses taken in the student's educational program; and
- successful completion of any other requirements prescribed by the local school board.

The 24 credits required for graduation are distributed as follows:

Beginning, July 1, 1999, the physical education credit requirement is increased to 1 full credit and required electives are reduced to 8 ½ credits. The total required amount for graduation remains at 24 credits.

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District school boards are authorized and encouraged to establish requirements for high school graduation in excess of the minimum requirements; however, an increase in academic credit or minimum grade point average requirements shall not apply to those students enrolled in grades 9 through 12 at the time the district school board increases the requirements. (s. 232.246(4)(c), F.S.)
