A bill to be entitled An act relating to mental health and substance abuse services; amending s. 394.67, F.S.; defining "older adult" with respect to the Community Alcohol, Drug Abuse, and Mental Health Services Act; creating s. 394.702, F.S.; providing guiding principles for the service planning process; amending s. 397.311, F.S.; defining "older adult" with respect to substance abuse services; amending ss. 397.416 and 440.102, F.S.; correcting cross references; including certain older adults in the target groups for substance abuse and mental health services of the Department of Children and Family Services; requiring the department to track and report on providers of such services to older adults; directing the department to establish training in aging, mental health, and substance abuse for providers, state agencies, and others; authorizing the department to accept grants for such training; directing the department to establish public education and outreach programs for mental health and substance abuse treatment for older adults; authorizing the department to accept grants for such purposes; providing for older adult interagency coordination of services demonstration projects for provision of mental health and substance abuse services to adults age 60 and over; providing for evaluation of demonstration projects; requiring a report;

1 providing an appropriation; providing an 2 effective date. 3 4 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: 5 6 Section 1. Subsections (15) through (20) of section 7 394.67, Florida Statutes, are renumbered as subsections (16) through (21), respectively, and a new subsection (15) is added 8 to said section to read: 9 10 394.67 Definitions.--As used in this part, the term: 11 (15) "Older adult" means a person age 60 or older. Section 2. Section 394.702, Florida Statutes, is 12 13 created to read: 14 394.702 Guiding principles for service planning.--The 15 following principles of the service planning process shall 16 guide the development of the publicly funded mental health and 17 substance abuse service delivery system: (1) The system of care should be centered on the 18 19 client, with the needs and strengths of the client and his or 20 her family or support system dictating the types and mix of 21 services provided. 22 (2) Citizens who reflect the diversity of client populations in terms of age, gender, ethnicity, and race 23 24 should be active participants in planning, selecting, and 25 delivering mental health and substance abuse services at the 26 local level, as well as in developing statewide policies for 27 older adult mental health and substance abuse services. 28 (3) Clients should receive individualized services, guided by an individualized service plan, in accordance with 29

the unique needs and strengths of each client and his or her

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family or support system.

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- (4) The system should include comprehensive screening, assessment, internal case finding, and outreach to identify citizens who are in need of mental health or substance abuse services and should target known risk factors.
- (5) Clients should receive services within the least restrictive environment appropriate to the service needs and quality of life of each client.
- (6) Mental health and substance abuse programs and services should support and strengthen families and support systems, so that families or support systems can more adequately meet the mental health and substance abuse services needs of clients.
- (7) Mental health and substance abuse services should be provided in a manner which is sensitive and responsive to the special needs that derive from the race, ethnicity, gender, and age of the client.
- Section 3. Subsections (21) through (30) of section 397.311, Florida Statutes, are renumbered as subsections (22) through (31), respectively, and a new subsection (21) is added to said section to read:
- 397.311 Definitions.--As used in this chapter, except part VIII:
- (21) "Older adult" means a person age 60 or older. Section 4. Subsection (2) of section 397.416, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:
- 397.416 Substance abuse treatment services; qualified professional.--
- (2) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a person who was certified through a certification process recognized by the former Department of Health and 31 Rehabilitative Services before January 1, 1995, may perform

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the duties of a qualified professional with respect to substance abuse treatment services as defined in this chapter, and need not meet the certification requirements contained in s. $397.311(26)\frac{(25)}{}$.

Section 5. Paragraphs (d) and (g) of subsection (1) of section 440.102, Florida Statutes, are amended to read:

440.102 Drug-free workplace program requirements.--The following provisions apply to a drug-free workplace program implemented pursuant to law or to rules adopted by the Agency for Health Care Administration:

- (1) DEFINITIONS.--Except where the context otherwise requires, as used in this act:
- (d) "Drug rehabilitation program" means a service provider, established pursuant to s. 397.311(29)(28), that provides confidential, timely, and expert identification, assessment, and resolution of employee drug abuse.
- (g) "Employee assistance program" means an established program capable of providing expert assessment of employee personal concerns; confidential and timely identification services with regard to employee drug abuse; referrals of employees for appropriate diagnosis, treatment, and assistance; and followup services for employees who participate in the program or require monitoring after returning to work. If, in addition to the above activities, an employee assistance program provides diagnostic and treatment services, these services shall in all cases be provided by service providers pursuant to s. 397.311(29)(28).

Section 6. <u>Target groups.--The Department of Children</u> and Family Services shall revise its target groups for <u>substance abuse and mental health services approved pursuant</u> to s. 216.0166, Florida Statutes, to include "older adults in

crisis," "older adults who are at risk of being placed in a more restrictive environment because of their mental illness or substance abuse," "older adults with severe and persistent mental illness," and "older adults in need of substance abuse treatment." The department shall track and report specifically on substance abuse and mental health services provided to older adults.

Section 7. <u>Substance abuse and mental health problems</u> among older adults; prevention and training program.--

- (1) Individuals treating or serving adults age 60 and over should have appropriate and ongoing training in aging, mental health, and substance abuse. The Department of Children and Family Services shall work with providers, licensure boards, professional organizations, educators, and other state agencies, including, but not limited to, the Department of Elderly Affairs, the Department of Health, and the Agency for Health Care Administration, to establish appropriate education and training. The department is encouraged to foster the development of continuing education by existing professional membership organizations and education institutions.
- (2) Training may include, but is not limited to, education regarding:
- (a) The incidence of mental health disorders and substance abuse among older adults.
- (b) The possible effects of mental health and substance abuse problems on the health of older adults.
- (c) Barriers to treatment of mental health disorders and substance abuse encountered by older adults.
- (d) Strategies for recognizing indicators of mental health or substance abuse problems.

(e) Community resources that offer preventive, 1 2 rehabilitative, and primary care services to older adults experiencing, or at risk of experiencing, mental health or 3 4 substance abuse problems, in order to facilitate the 5 provider's ability to make appropriate referrals. 6 (f) Treatment modalities that have been shown to be 7 effective in helping older adults with mental health or 8 substance abuse problems. (3) The department may accept, for the purposes of 9 this section, any special grant of money, services, or 10 property from the Federal Government, or any of its agencies, 11 12 or from any foundation, organization, or medical school. 13 Section 8. Public education and outreach to older 14 adults.--15 (1) The Department of Children and Family Services 16 shall develop methods of information dissemination designed to overcome the barriers to mental health and substance abuse 17 treatment within the population of adults age 60 and over. 18 19 Innovative outreach programs must be developed and promoted to 20 improve the diversion of older adults from expensive and intensive forms of care. The department shall develop a 21 marketing and public education plan for how best to develop 22 23 prevention and treatment strategies aimed at an older 24 audience. The department shall work with other state agencies, including, but not limited to, the Department of Elderly 25 26 Affairs, the Department of Health, and the Agency for Health 27 Care Administration, to develop innovative marketing and 28 public education materials and strategies. 29 (2) The department may accept, for the purposes of this section, any special grant of money, services, or 30

property from the Federal Government, or any of its agencies, or from any foundation or organization.

Section 9. <u>Older adult interagency coordination of</u> services demonstration projects.--

(1) DEVELOPMENT. --

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- (a) The Agency for Health Care Administration, the

 Department of Health, the Department of Children and Family

 Services, and the Department of Elderly Affairs shall form a

 consortium, hereinafter referred to as "the consortium," by

 entering into a partnership agreement to create and oversee

 older adult interagency coordination of services demonstration

 projects for the provision of mental health and substance

 abuse services to adults age 60 and over. The Department of

 Elderly Affairs shall be the lead agency.
- (b) The consortium shall implement at least one demonstration project and may implement up to three demonstration projects. The demonstration projects shall operate for 3 years.
- interagency coordination of services demonstration projects is to test various designs and strategies for the planning, integration, or coordination of the interagency delivery of services to older adults who have mental health or substance abuse problems, and their families or support systems. Each demonstration project shall seek to:
- (a) Refine the process of case management using the strengths approach in assessment and service planning and eliminate case management duplication.
- (b) Employ natural supports in the family and the community to help meet the service needs of the older adult.

1 (c) Improve interagency planning efforts through 2 greater collaboration between public and private community-based agencies. 3 4 (3) EVALUATION.--The Agency for Health Care 5 Administration shall conduct an evaluation of the 6 demonstration projects. The agency shall submit a copy of its 7 evaluation to the Secretary of Elderly Affairs, the Secretary 8 of Health, the Secretary of Children and Family Services, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of 9 Representatives by December 31, 2004. 10 Section 10. There is hereby appropriated from the 11 12 General Revenue Fund to the Department of Children and Family 13 Services the sum of \$250,000 to provide training in aging, mental health, and substance abuse to individuals serving 14 15 older adults, as specified in section 7, and to provide for 16 establishment of public education and outreach programs, as 17 specified in section 8.
