I. SUMMARY:

This legislation re-creates the Administrative Trust Fund without modification, effective November 4, 2000. The Administrative Trust Fund, FLAIR #68-2-021, is administered by the Agency for Health Care Administration. This fund was last re-created effective November 4, 1996, by Chapter 96-91, Laws of Florida.

II. SUBSTANTIVE ANALYSIS:

A. PRESENT SITUATION:

1. MAJOR STATUTES THAT CONTROL THE TRUST FUND:

No reference in statutes.

2. BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE FUND'S USES OR PURPOSES:

The trust fund is generally used to budget the federal share of the Medicaid administrative costs in the Agency for Health Care Administration and Title XXI funds.

3. MAJOR SOURCES OF REVENUE FOR THE FUND:

The major sources of revenue for the fund are Medicaid, Child Health Insurance, and transfers from other entities. According to Comptroller data, receipts to this fund for FY 1998-99 were \$79,070,862.19.

B. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

This bill re-creates the trust fund without modification.
