26-861B-00 1 A bill to be entitled 2 An act providing for a study on children with 3 developmental delays; providing purposes; 4 providing for a commission and its membership, 5 officers, and meetings; providing for the 6 administration of the study and for staff and 7 expenses; prescribing the components of the study; authorizing the employment of expert 8 9 consultants; providing for advisory workgroups; requiring reports to the Legislature; providing 10 an appropriation; providing for expiration of 11 12 the act; providing an effective date. 13 WHEREAS, the healthy development of Florida's infants 14 and children is often hampered by their exposure to multiple 15 16 stresses, traumatic events such as child abuse and family violence, mental or emotional disorders, or developmental 17 delays or disabilities that result in personal and family 18 19 hardships and extreme financial costs to public and private 20 community-based systems, and 21 WHEREAS, recent brain research, as well as other 22 clinical and social research, has confirmed that there exists 23 a window of opportunity for successfully intervening with children experiencing and at risk of emotional, social, 24 25 cognitive, learning, and other developmental delays, and 26 WHEREAS, the consequences of young children entering 27 school and becoming adults with mental disorders or 28 developmental disabilities and delays not only affect children 29 and families but also affect systems that are publicly 30 supported, such as welfare assistance, child protection, 31

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   criminal justice, special education, and other public social
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    and health-related systems, and
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           WHEREAS, there should be a comprehensive evaluation of
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    the needs of Florida's children who are at high risk of
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    significant delays and serious developmental problems that are
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   preventable and an evaluation of the interventions available,
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    and
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           WHEREAS, Florida's systems of care and public and
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   private resources need to be better integrated and coordinated
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    to intervene early and thus to prevent the adverse effects of
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    child abuse and neglect, community violence, mental disorders,
    learning disorders, and developmental delays and problems,
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   NOW, THEREFORE,
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    Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
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           Section 1. Short title. -- This act may be cited as the
   "Study on Children with Developmental Delays Act."
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           Section 2. Purpose. -- The purpose of this act is to
    examine how this state can better identify and effectively
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    serve those young children with or at high risk of mental
    disorders or developmental delays and disabilities, with the
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    goal of optimally minimizing the adverse effects of those
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    delays and disabilities on children in this state. As used in
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    this act, the term "children with developmental delays" means
    those infants and young children from birth to 5 years of age
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    who are experiencing or are at high risk for developing
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    emotional, cognitive, social, learning, and other
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    developmental delays or long-term mental or developmental
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    disabilities or conditions. The study must recognize that
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    families, as well as other community-based entities, play a
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1 major role in preventing or minimizing certain risks to the child, enhancing the child's development, and minimizing the 2 3 long-term disabling impact of any developmental delay or disability. The study should focus on developing 4 5 early-intervention strategies and programs that provide б individualized treatment and other services to infants and young children and to their families so that the children will 7 8 not suffer unnecessarily because their problems and deficits were never identified or were mislabeled. The study must 9 10 document the ways in which providing appropriate early 11 interventions to young children who experience these developmental delays or deficits or early negative family 12 circumstances will afford a more productive life for these 13 children as well as result in cost savings to public systems 14 such as the criminal justice and child welfare systems. The 15 study must use to the greatest possible extent the work and 16 17 findings of other groups. Section 3. Study on children with developmental 18 19 delays; administration; study commission membership; 20 components of study .--21 (1) ADMINISTRATION OF STUDY; STAFF; EXPENSES.--The Florida Partnership for School Readiness shall conduct the 22 study on children with developmental delays to meet the 23 24 purposes prescribed in this act. The Executive Office of the Governor, the Department of Children and Family Services, and 25 the Children's Medical Services of the Department of Health 26 27 shall provide assistance to the partnership on request. 28 (a) The partnership shall appoint a study commission 29 to carry out the activities required for the study. The 30 commission is to consist of the following 15 members: 31 The Secretary of Juvenile Justice. 1.

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1 2. A representative of the Department of Children and 2 Family Services. 3 3. A representative of the Department of Education. 4 4. The Executive Director of the Agency for Health 5 Care Administration. б 5. A representative of the Department of Health. 7 The Department of Psychiatry Chair of the 6. 8 University of Florida Brain Institute. 9 7. The Department of Pediatrics Chair of the 10 University of Miami Medical School. 11 8. The chair of the Florida School Readiness 12 Partnership Board. 9. The chair of the Florida Interagency Coordinating 13 14 Council for Infants and Toddlers. 10. A professional who has expertise in the needs of 15 children with learning disabilities. 16 17 11. A professional who has expertise in the needs of children with emotional or mental disorders. 18 19 12. A professional who has expertise in the needs of children with developmental disabilities. 20 21 13. A professional with expertise in the diagnosis and treatment of children with speech and language disorders. 22 23 14. A professional with expertise in the 24 early-intervention and prevention services rendered to 25 children in this state. The parent of a child with a learning disability 26 15. 27 or emotional or mental disorder. (b) Appointments to the study commission must be 28 29 completed within 2 weeks after this act takes effect, and the 30 study commission must conduct its initial meeting within 1 month after this act takes effect. The partnership executive 31 4

1 director shall appoint a study coordinator within 15 days after the appointment of the commission, within funds 2 3 appropriated. The partnership executive director may appoint one professional staff member and one clerical staff member 4 5 within funds appropriated, subject to the approval of the б partnership. The staff shall serve under the direction of the 7 partnership executive director and shall perform the duties 8 assigned by the partnership. An agency head may not designate a representative to attend study commission meetings on his or 9 her behalf. Professional members of the study commission must 10 11 be appointed in consultation with the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives. 12 (c) Members of the study commission and members of the 13 advisory workgroups shall serve without compensation, but are 14 entitled to receive reimbursement for per diem and travel 15 expenses as provided in section 112.061, Florida Statutes. 16 17 (2) COMPONENTS OF THE STUDY. -- The study on children 18 with developmental delays shall contain the following 19 components: (a) Examination of the research and best practices in 20 the pertinent psychiatric/medical, social, 21 psychological/behavioral, and education professions in order 22 to identify early interventions that will prevent or minimize 23 the adverse effects of emotional, social, cognitive, learning, 24 25 or developmental delays or disabilities on children and their families. 26 27 (b) Determination of the best existing, age-appropriate screening and evaluation tools, such as School 28 29 Readiness uniform screening, which are currently used by 30 community service providers and education entities to identify

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1 and link children with appropriate specialized interventions 2 and services. 3 (c) Identification of community risk factors such as chronic community and family violence which expose infants and 4 5 young children to a variety of developmental and clinical б problems and limit the effectiveness of parents. 7 (d) Identification of existing services and programs 8 in this state which are effective and which need to be 9 expanded in scope, availability, or geographic access and identification of new services, programs, or interventions 10 11 that have proven effective by means that include a review of the professional expertise, available and unavailable, in this 12 state to provide these services. 13 (e) Determination of the configuration and 14 organizational arrangement of the delivery systems for 15 early-intervention services and programs to assure 16 17 coordination and integration with existing systems, which include, but are not limited to, School Readiness, Infants and 18 19 Toddlers Early Intervention Program, Pre-Kindergarten Disability Program, Healthy Start Program, Healthy Families 20 21 Florida, Florida KidCare, child and adolescent mental health services, juvenile justice programs, developmental services, 22 foster care services, group care services, domestic violence 23 24 services, and teenage parent programs. 25 (f) Determination of the costs of providing services 26 and propose funding options. 27 (q) Based upon these finding and conclusions, preparation of a plan for building a comprehensive 28 29 early-intervention system in this state for young children 30 with or at high risk of developmental delays or problems and recommendation of public policy changes that will address the 31

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1 issue of violence prevention. The plan must include a description of services and programs accessible to all 2 3 communities in this state, budget and resource needs, proposed statutory revisions, legislative funding options, and an 4 5 implementation schedule. б (3) EXPERT CONSULTANTS. -- The study commission, with 7 the approval of the partnership, may invite national experts 8 in the area of brain research, child development and early intervention, and violence intervention to participate in the 9 10 study activities and to make pertinent recommendations 11 concerning this state's prevention and early-intervention strategies, programs, and services. Fees may be paid to the 12 consultants from the appropriation for the study. 13 (4) ADVISORY WORKGROUPS. -- The study commission shall 14 establish at least two advisory workgroups. One must be a 15 scientific advisory workgroup composed of scientific experts 16 17 who will examine the effectiveness of various early-intervention and prevention programs, preparing a report 18 19 for the study commission to help guide selection of programs. The other must be a community advisory workgroup composed of 20 21 state agency program representatives; parents of children who are at-risk of developmental delays or disabilities; parents 22 of children with disorders or disabilities; local providers of 23 24 child care, early-intervention services, and other relevant services; a local school readiness coalition representative; a 25 regional policy council representative; and other experts in 26 27 the field or service system. This community advisory workgroup shall provide the study commission with technical assistance 28 29 on the services and systems of this state. 30 (5) REPORT.--The partnership must submit its report by 31 January 1, 2001, to the President of the Senate, the Speaker

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1	of the House of Representatives, and the chairpersons of the
2	appropriate substantive committees of each house of the
3	Legislature.
4	(6) APPROPRIATIONThere is appropriated for fiscal
5	year 2000-2001 the sum of \$300,000 from the General Revenue
6	Fund to the Florida Partnership on School Readiness to fund
7	the study. Of this appropriation, \$100,000 may be used to
8	reimburse national consultants in child development, brain
9	development, violence prevention, and other related areas who
10	provide consultation and share their expertise with the study
11	commission.
12	Section 4. This act expires June 30, 2001.
13	Section 5. This act shall take effect upon becoming a
14	law.
