House Memorial

A memorial to the Congress of the United States, urging Congress to adopt legislation to end the practice of denying old-age and survivors insurance benefit payments and Medicare and Medicaid benefits to prisoners and certain other individuals confined at public expense and to provide for payment of such benefits directly to the agencies responsible for the housing and medical care of such individuals.

WHEREAS, the Federal Government has prohibited monthly old-age and survivors insurance benefit payments and Medicaid benefits as well as requiring burdensome documentation and collection procedures before reimbursement can be made for Medicare benefits to any individual currently confined in a jail, prison, or other penal institution or correctional facility for conviction of an offense punishable by imprisonment for more than one year, or to any individual who is confined by a court order in an institution at public expense as a result of a finding of incompetency, insanity, or mental defect in connection with an offense punishable by imprisonment for more than one year, and

WHEREAS, the State of Florida recognizes the fact that daily subsistence costs and medical treatment costs for incarcerated offenders in the correctional system are a great burden to the taxpayers of the state, and consequently the state currently directs certain prisoners to pay for all or a fair portion of their daily subsistence and certain medical costs, and

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WHEREAS, the Federal Government has prohibited incarcerated individuals who have lawfully paid federal employment taxes from receiving benefits to which they are entitled, and

WHEREAS, federal denial of such benefits forces states to fund housing and medical costs for these individuals who otherwise would be entitled to receive such benefits, and

WHEREAS, this federal denial of the payment of old-age and survivors insurance benefit payments and Medicare and Medicaid benefits is an erosion of the principle of states' rights and the rights of individuals, the effect of which forces states to spend increasing portions of their budgets on correctional systems, and

WHEREAS, the State of Florida, along with other states, would be better able to fulfill its budgetary obligations if the Federal Government would allow such payments and benefits to be made directly to the agencies responsible for the housing and medical care of such individuals, and

WHEREAS, the denial by the Federal Government of the payment of old-age and survivors insurance benefit payments and Medicaid benefits to prisoners and other individuals who receive housing and medical care in publicly funded institutions is a Congressional infringement upon the rights to which all citizens are entitled, and

WHEREAS, the payment of old-age and survivors insurance benefit payments and Medicaid benefits owed to prisoners and other individuals who receive housing and medical care in publicly funded institutions directly to the agencies responsible for the housing and medical care of such individuals would aid significantly in decreasing state

correctional system budget expenditures and lessen a burden on the taxpayers of the state, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

 That the Congress of the United States is requested to adopt legislation to end the practice of denying old-age and survivors insurance benefit payments and Medicaid benefits and repeal the burdensome requirements for reimbursement for Medicare to prisoners and certain other individuals who receive housing and medical care in publicly funded institutions and to provide for payment of such benefits directly to the agencies responsible for the housing and medical care of such individuals.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this memorial be dispatched to the President of the United States, the President of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, and to each member of the Florida delegation to the United States Congress.
