Paragraph (c) of subsection (2) of section 11 231.621, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 231.621 Critical Teacher Shortage Student Loan 12 13 Forgiveness Program. --14 (2) From the funds available, the Department of 15 Education is authorized to make loan principal repayments as follows: 16 17 (c) All repayments shall be contingent on continued proof of employment in the designated subject areas in this 18 19 state and shall be made directly to the holder of the loan. 20 The state shall not bear responsibility for the collection of any interest charges or other remaining balance. Section 240.40207, Florida Statutes, is 2 amended to read: 3 240.40207 Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars award.--The Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars award is 4 5 created within the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program б to recognize and reward academic achievement and vocational 7 preparation by high school students who wish to continue their 8 education. Beginning with the fall term of 2002, a Florida 9 Gold Seal Vocational Scholars award may not be used at a baccalaureate degree-granting institution unless the award is 10 11 a renewal of an initial award issued prior to the fall term of 12 2002. 6	Provides for renewal, reinstatement, and restoration of an award. Revises accreditation requirements for the
7	following: for postsecondary education institution participation in the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship
8	Program, the Jose Marti Scholarship Challenge Grant Program, and the Seminole and Miccosukee Indian
9	Scholarships, and for a definition of the term "institution." Requires the Department of Education to
10	define matriculation and fees for purposes of the Florida Academic Scholars award, the Florida Merit Scholars
11	award, the Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars award, for the calculation of awards of Bright Futures
12	Scholarship recipients attending nonpublic institutions, and for the use of funds for the education of children of
