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postsecondary level. A student whose native language is not 1 2 English is exempt from this admissions requirement, provided 3 that the student demonstrates proficiency in the native 4 language. If a standardized test is not available in the student's native language for the demonstration of 5 6 proficiency, the university may provide an alternative method 7 of assessment. The State Board of Education shall adopt rules for the articulation of foreign language competency and 8 9 equivalency between secondary and postsecondary institutions. 10 A student who received an associate in arts degree prior to September 1, 1989, or who enrolled in a program of studies 11 12 leading to an associate degree from a Florida community college prior to August 1, 1989, and maintains continuous 13 enrollment shall be exempt from this admissions requirement. 14 15 (c) Each student have submitted a test score from the Scholastic Assessment Test of the College Entrance Examination 16 17 Board or the American College Testing Program. 18 (2) The minimum admission standards adopted by the Board of Regents or a state university must permit a student 19 20 to earn at least four of the nineteen credits constituting the 21 college-preparatory curriculum required for admission as electives in any one of the following manners: 22 (a) Successful completion of any course identified in 23 24 the Department of Education course code directory as level two or higher in one or more of the following subject areas: 25 26 English, mathematics, natural science, social science, and 27 foreign language; 28 (b) Successful completion of any course identified in 29 the Department of Education course code directory as level 30 three in the same or related disciplines; (c) Any combination of the courses identified in 31 2 2:05 PM 04/25/00 s2062c1c-06m0a

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paragraphs (a) and (b); or 1 2 (d) Successful completion of two credits from the 3 courses identified in paragraph (a), plus no more than two 4 total credits from the following categories of courses: 5 1. Courses identified in the Department of Education 6 course code directory as ROTC and military training; 7 2. Courses identified in the Department of Education corse code directory as level two in art-visual arts, dance, 8 drama-theatre arts, language arts, or music; or 9 10 3. Any additional courses determined to be equivalent by the Articulation Coordinating Committee. 11 12 (3)(2) The Board of Regents shall adopt rules which provide for a limited number of students to be admitted to the 13 State University System, notwithstanding the admission 14 15 requirements of paragraph (1)(b) relating to credits in 16 foreign language, if there is evidence that the applicant is 17 expected to do successful academic work at the admitting university. The number of applicants admitted under this 18 subsection may not exceed 5 percent of the total number of 19 freshmen who entered the State University System the prior 20 year. Any lower-division student admitted without meeting the 21 foreign language requirement must earn such credits prior to 22 admission to the upper division of a state university. Any 23 24 associate in arts admission to the upper division of a state university. Any associate in arts degree graduate from a 25 public community college or university in Florida, or other 26 27 upper-division transfer student, admitted without meeting the 28 foreign language requirement, must earn such credits prior to graduation from a state university. Students shall be exempt 29 30 from the provisions of this subsection if they can demonstrate 31 proficiency in American sign language equivalent to that of

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1 students who have completed two credits of such instruction in 2 high school.

3 <u>(4)(3)</u>(a) Nonresident students may be admitted to the 4 university upon such terms as the university may establish. 5 However, such terms shall include, but shall not be limited 6 to: completion of a secondary school curriculum which 7 includes 4 years of English; 3 years each of mathematics, 8 science, and social sciences; and 2 years of a foreign 9 language.

10 (b) Within the admission standards provided for in 11 subsection (1), the Board of Regents shall develop procedures 12 for weighting courses which are necessary to meet the 13 requirements of a college-preparatory curriculum at a higher value than less rigorous courses. Credits received in such 14 15 courses shall be given greater value in determining admission 16 by universities than cumulative grade point averages in high 17 school.

18 <u>(5)(4)</u> Consideration shall be given to the past 19 actions of any person applying for admission as a student to 20 any state university, either as a new applicant, an applicant 21 for continuation of studies, or a transfer student, when such 22 actions have been found to disrupt or interfere with the 23 orderly conduct, processes, functions, or programs of any 24 other university, college, or community college.

25 (6)(5) In any application for admission by a student as a citizen of the state, the applicant, if 18 years of age, or, if a minor, his or her parents or guardian shall make and file with such application a written statement under oath that such applicant is a citizen and resident of the state and entitled, as such, to admission upon the terms and conditions prescribed for citizens and residents of the state.

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(7)(6) Rules of the State Board of Education shall 1 2 require the use of scores on tests of college-level 3 communication and computation skills provided in s. 229.551 as 4 a condition for admission of students to upper-division 5 instructional programs from community colleges, including those who have been awarded associate in arts degrees. Use of 6 7 such test scores as an admission requirement shall extend equally and uniformly to students enrolled in lower divisions 8 9 in the State University System and to transfer students from 10 other colleges and universities. The tests shall be required 11 for community college students seeking associate in arts 12 degrees and students seeking admission to upper-division 13 instructional programs in the State University System. The use of test scores prior to August 1, 1984, shall be limited 14 15 to student counseling and curriculum improvement.

16 <u>(8)</u>(7) For the purposes of this section, American sign 17 language constitutes a foreign language. Florida high schools 18 may offer American sign language as a for-credit elective or 19 as a substitute for any already authorized foreign language 20 requirement.

21 (9) (9) (8) A Florida resident who is denied admission as 22 an undergraduate to a state university for failure to meet the high school grade point average requirement may appeal the 23 24 decision to the university and request a recalculation of the 25 grade point average including in the revised calculation the grades earned in up to three credits of advanced fine arts 26 27 courses. The university shall provide the student with a description of the appeals process at the same time as 28 notification of the admissions decision. The university shall 29 30 recalculate the student's grade point average using the 31 additional courses and advise the student of any changes in

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the student's admission status. For purposes of this section, 1 2 fine arts courses include courses in music, drama, painting, 3 sculpture, speech, debate, or a course in any art form that 4 requires manual dexterity. Advanced level fine arts courses include fine arts courses identified in the course code 5 directory as Advanced Placement, pre-International 6 7 Baccalaureate, or International Baccalaureate, or fine arts courses taken in the third or fourth year of a fine arts 8 9 curriculum. 10 11 12 And the title is amended as follows: 13 14 On page 1, line 18, after the semicolon 15 16 insert: 17 revising requirements for minimum standards for undergraduate admission relating to foreign 18 19 language; allowing students to use up to two 20 credits in art, music, drama, speech, debate, 21 humanities, or military science courses to count towards the admission requirements; 22 23 requiring submission of a test score; 24 25 26 27 28 29 30 31

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
