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WHEREAS, pursuant to legal precedent of the Florida 1 2 Supreme Court, including Whitaker v. Parsons, 86 So. 247 (Fla. 3 1920) and Amos v. Matthews, 126 So. 308 (Fla. 1930), it is 4 clearly within the prerogative of the Legislature to define 5 the purview of the new State Board of Education and the State Constitution does not withhold from the Legislature the power 6 7 to prescribe additional powers and duties on constitutional, 8 statutory, and administrative officers so long as such powers 9 and duties are not inconsistent with their duties imposed by the constitution, and 10 WHEREAS, the minutes and records of the 1998 State of 11 12 Florida Constitution Revision Commission re the proposal to amend s. 2, Art. IX state as follows: "[This proposal] sets up 13 14 a State Board of Education and moves the function of the State Board of Education from the Cabinet to an appointed board of 15 seven appointed by the Governor. That board then selects the 16 17 Commissioner of Education. This is not a Cabinet reform bill. . . . This is an educational proposal. . . . ", NOW, THEREFORE, 21 22 23 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: 24 25 Section 1. Short title. -- This act may be cited as the "Florida Education Governance Reorganization Act of 2000." 26 27 Section 2. Declaration of policy and guiding principles.--28 29 (1) It is the policy of the Legislature: (a) To achieve within existing resources true systemic 30 31 change in education governance by establishing a seamless 4

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academic educational system that fosters an integrated 1 continuum of kindergarten through graduate school education 2 3 for Florida's citizens.
