Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 101.657, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

101.657 Voting absentee ballots in person.--

(1) Notwithstanding s. 97.021(1), any qualified and registered elector who is unable to attend the polls on election day may pick up and vote an absentee ballot in person at the office of, and under the supervision of, the supervisor of elections. Before receiving the ballot, the elector must present a Florida driver's license, a Florida identification card issued under s. 322.051, or another form of picture identification approved by the Department of State. If the elector fails to furnish the required identification, or if the supervisor is in doubt as to the identity of the elector, the supervisor must follow the procedure prescribed in s. 101.49.

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          (2) As an alternative to the provisions of ss. 101.64,
    101.647, and 101.65, the supervisor of elections may allow an
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    elector to cast an absentee ballot in the main or branch
    office of the supervisor by depositing the voted ballot in a
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    voting device used by the supervisor to collect or tabulate
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    ballots. The results or tabulation may not be made before the
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    close of the polls on election day.
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          (3) The elector must provide picture identification
    and must complete an In-Office Voter Certificate in
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    substantially the following form:

The canvassing board shall review the ballot 10 11 and decide the validity of the ballot by majority vote. (5) The canvass of returns for ballots cast under this 12 section shall be substantially the same as votes cast by 13 14 electors in precincts, as provided in s. 101.5614. Section 2. Subsections (1) and (8) of section 102.012, 15 Florida Statutes, are amended to read: 16 17 102.012 Inspectors and clerks to conduct elections .--(1) The supervisor of elections of each county, at 18 19 least 20 days prior to the holding of any election, shall 20 appoint two election boards for each precinct in the county; however, the supervisor of elections may, in any election, 21 appoint one election board if the supervisor has reason to 22 believe that only one is necessary. Each election board shall 23 24 be composed of three inspectors and a clerk. The clerk shall 25 be in charge of, and responsible for, seeing that the election board carries out its duties and responsibilities. Each 26 inspector and each clerk shall take and subscribe to an oath 27 28 or affirmation, which shall be written or printed, to the 29 effect that he or she will perform the duties of inspector or clerk of election, respectively, according to law and will 30

31 endeavor to prevent all fraud, deceit, or abuse in conducting

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30 31 the election. The oath may be taken before an officer authorized to administer oaths or before any of the persons who are to act as inspectors, one of them to swear the others, and one of the others sworn thus, in turn, to administer the oath to the one who has not been sworn. The oaths shall be returned with the poll list and the returns of the election to the supervisor. In all questions that may arise before the members of an election board, the decision of a majority of them shall decide the question. The supervisor of elections of each county shall be responsible for the attendance and diligent performance of his or her duties by each clerk and inspector.

(8) The supervisor of elections shall conduct training classes for inspectors, clerks, and deputy sheriffs prior to each first primary, general, and special election for the purpose of instructing such persons in their duties and responsibilities as election officials. A certificate may be issued by the supervisor of elections to each person completing such training. No person shall serve as an inspector, clerk, or deputy sheriff for an election unless such person has completed the training class as required. A person who has attended previous training classes conducted within 2 years of the election may be appointed by the supervisor to fill a vacancy on election day. If no person with prior training is available to fill such vacancy, the supervisor of elections may fill such vacancy in accordance with the provisions of subsection (9) from among persons who have not received the training required by this section.

Section 3. Subsection (2) of section 102.021, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

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21	STATEMENT OF SUBSTANTIAL CHANGES CONTAINED IN COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR
22	SB 270
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24	Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 270 removes the provision in the bill requiring the last four digits of a voter's social security number on the Voter Certificate. The committee substitute also removes the requirement that supervisors of elections hold formal training classes for poll workers. This will allow more flexibility in the manner in which poll workers receive training.
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
