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24	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
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26	Section 1. Section 97.071, Florida Statutes, is
27	amended to read:
28	97.071 Registration identification card
29	(1) A registration identification card must be
30	furnished to all voters registering under the permanent single
31	registration system and must contain:
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1 (a) Voter's registration number. 2 (b) Date of registration. 3 (c) Full name. (d) Party affiliation. 4 5 (e) Date of birth. б (f) Race or ethnicity, if provided by the applicant. 7 Sex, if provided by the applicant. (q) 8 (h) Address of legal residence. (i) Precinct number. 9 10 (j) Signature of supervisor. 11 (k) Place for voter's signature. 12 (1) Other information deemed necessary by the 13 department. 14 (2)(a) Except as provided in paragraph (b), the 15 supervisor of elections shall mail a registration identification card to the voter at the address listed as the 16 17 legal residence on the voter's registration application. The card must be sent by nonforwardable, return-if-undeliverable 18 19 mail. If the identification card is returned as undeliverable and the voter has indicated a different mailing address on the 20 21 registration application, the supervisor must mail a notice to the mailing address, notifying the voter that his or her 22 registration identification card was returned and that the 23 24 voter may appear in person at the supervisor's office to pick 25 up the identification card. The supervisor must surrender the identification card to the elector upon presentation of a 26 27 Florida driver's license, a Florida identification card issued 28 under s. 322.051, or another form of picture identification approved by the Department of State. If the elector fails to 29 30 furnish the required identification, or if the supervisor has 31 doubts as to the identity of the elector, the supervisor must

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1 require the elector to swear an oath substantially similar to 2 the one prescribed in s. 101.49 prior to surrendering the 3 identification card. The supervisor must keep the 4 identification card on file for 45 days following return of 5 the card as undeliverable. б (b) The supervisor shall mail the voter identification card by forwardable mail to voters who are covered by the 7 8 Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act. 9 (2) (3) A voter may receive a replacement of a 10 registration identification card by providing a signed, 11 written request for a replacement card to the supervisor. Upon verification of registration, the supervisor shall issue the 12 13 voter a duplicate card without charge. 14 (3)(4) In the case of a change of name, address, or 15 party affiliation, the supervisor must issue the voter a new registration identification card. However, a registration 16 17 identification card indicating a party affiliation change made between the book-closing date for the first primary election 18 19 and the date of the second primary election may not be issued 20 until after the second primary election. Section 2. Effective January 1, 2001, section 101.64, 21 Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 22 101.64 Delivery of absentee ballots; envelopes; 23 24 form.--25 (1) The supervisor shall enclose with each absentee ballot two envelopes: a secrecy envelope, into which the 26 27 absent elector shall enclose his or her marked ballot; and a 28 mailing envelope, into which the absent elector shall then 29 place the secrecy envelope, which shall be addressed to the supervisor and also bear on the back side a certificate in 30 31 substantially the following form: 3

I may not be in the precinct of my residence during 18 19 the hours the polls are open for voting on election day. 20 I am an inspector, a poll worker, a deputy voting 3. machine custodian, a deputy sheriff, a supervisor of 21 22 elections, or a deputy supervisor who is assigned to a different precinct than that in which I am registered. 23 24 4. On account of the tenets of my religion, I cannot 25 attend the polls on the day of the general, special, or primary election. 26 27 I have changed my permanent residency to another 5. 28 county in Florida within the time period during which the 29 registration books are closed for the election. I understand that I am allowed to vote only for national and statewide 30 31 offices and on statewide issues.

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1 6. I have changed my permanent residency to another 2 state and am unable under the laws of such state to vote in 3 the general election. I understand that I am allowed to vote 4 only for President and Vice President. 5 7. I am unable to attend the polls on election day and б am voting this ballot in person at the office of, and under 7 the supervision of, the county supervisor of elections. 8 ...     the absent elector and the attesting witness are across the
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    seal of the envelope; however, no statement shall appear on
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    the envelope which indicates that a signature of the voter or

           Section 3. Effective January 1, 2001, section 101.65,
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    Florida Statutes, is amended to read:
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1 101.65 Instructions to absent electors.--The 2 supervisor shall enclose with each absentee ballot separate 3 printed instructions in substantially the following form: 4 5 READ THESE INSTRUCTIONS CAREFULLY BEFORE MARKING BALLOT. 6 1. VERY IMPORTANT. In order to ensure that your 7 absentee ballot will be counted, it should be completed and returned as soon as possible so that it can reach the 8 9 supervisor of elections of the county in which your precinct 10 is located no later than 7 p.m. on the day of the election. 11 2. Mark your ballot in secret as instructed on the ballot. You must mark your own ballot unless you are unable to 12 13 do so because of blindness, disability, or inability to read 14 or write. 15 3. Place your marked ballot in the enclosed secrecy 16 envelope. 17 4. Insert the secrecy envelope into the enclosed mailing envelope which is addressed to the supervisor. 18 19 5. Seal the mailing envelope and completely fill out 20 the Voter's Certificate on the back of the mailing envelope. 6. VERY IMPORTANT. In order for your absentee ballot 21 22 to be counted, you must sign your name on the line above (Voter's Signature)., place the last four digits of your 23 24 Social Security number in the space provided, and your ballot 25 must be witnessed in either of the following manners: a. One witness, who is a registered voter in the 26 27 state, must affix his or her signature, printed name, address, 28 voter identification number, and county of registration on the 29 voter's certificate. Each witness is limited to witnessing five ballots per election unless certified as an absentee 30 31 7

1 ballot coordinator. A candidate may not serve as an attesting 2 witness. 3 b. Any notary or other officer entitled to administer 4 oaths or any Florida supervisor of elections or deputy 5 supervisor of elections, other than a candidate, may serve as б an attesting witness. 7 7. VERY IMPORTANT. In order for your absentee ballot 8 to be counted, it must include the signature and address of a 9 witness 18 years of age or older affixed to the voter's 10 certificate. A candidate may not serve as an attesting 11 witness. 8.7. Mail, deliver, or have delivered the completed 12 13 mailing envelope. Be sure there is sufficient postage if 14 mailed. 9.8. FELONY NOTICE. It is a felony under Florida law 15 to accept any gift, payment, or gratuity in exchange for your 16 17 vote for a candidate. It is also a felony under Florida law to vote in an election using a false identity or false address, 18 19 or under any other circumstances making your ballot false or fraudulent. 20 Section 4. Effective January 1, 2001, paragraph (c) of 21 subsection (2) of section 101.68, Florida Statutes, is amended 22 23 to read: 24 101.68 Canvassing of absentee ballot .--25 (2)The canvassing board shall, if the supervisor 26 (c)1. 27 has not already done so, compare the signature of the elector 28 on the voter's certificate with the signature of the elector 29 in the registration books to see that the elector is duly registered in the county and to determine the legality of that 30 31 absentee ballot. illegal if it does not include the signature and the last four 1 2 digits of the social security number of the elector, as shown 3 by the registration records, and the signature and address of 4 an attesting witness.either: 5 a. The subscription of a notary or officer defined in б Item 6.b. of the instruction sheet, or 7 b. The signature, printed name, address, voter 8 identification number, and county of registration of one 9 attesting witness, who is a registered voter in the state. 10 11 However, an absentee ballot shall not be considered illegal if the signature of the elector or attesting witness does not 12 13 cross the seal of the mailing envelope or if the person 14 witnessing the ballot is in violation of s. 104.047(3). If the canvassing board determines that any ballot is illegal, a 15 member of the board shall, without opening the envelope, mark 16 17 across the face of the envelope: "rejected as illegal." The envelope and the ballot contained therein shall be preserved 18 19 in the manner that official ballots voted are preserved. 20 If any elector or candidate present believes that 2. an absentee ballot is illegal due to a defect apparent on the 21 22 voter's certificate, he or she may, at any time before the ballot is removed from the envelope, file with the canvassing 23 24 board a protest against the canvass of that ballot, specifying 25 the precinct, the ballot, and the reason he or she believes the ballot to be illegal. A challenge based upon a defect in 26 the voter's certificate may not be accepted after the ballot 27 28 has been removed from the mailing envelope. 29 Section 5. Section 101.647, Florida Statutes, is 30 amended to read: 31 101.647 Return of absentee ballots.--9

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1 (1) Absentee ballots must be returned to the supervisor of elections by the elector, either in person or by 2 3 mail. (2) If the elector is unable to mail or personally 4 5 deliver the ballot, the elector may designate in writing a б person who may return the ballot for the elector; however, the 7 person designated may not return more than two absentee ballots per election, other than the designee's own ballot, 8 9 except that additional ballots may be returned for members of the designee's immediate family. For purposes of this 10 11 section, the term "immediate family" means the designee's spouse or the parent, child, grandparent, or sibling of the 12 designee or of the designee's spouse. The designee must 13 14 provide to the supervisor the written authorization by the elector and a picture identification of the designee and must 15 complete an affidavit. The designee shall state in the 16 17 affidavit that the designee is authorized to return that ballot and shall indicate if the elector is a member of the 18 19 designee's immediate family and, if so, the relationship. The 20 designee shall also state in the affidavit that the designee 21 has not and will not return more than two absentee ballots for this election, other than the designee's own ballot and 22 ballots for the designee's immediate family. The department 23 24 shall prescribe the form of the affidavit. If the supervisor 25 is satisfied that the designee is authorized under law to return the ballot, the supervisor shall accept receipt of the 26 27 ballot. 28 Section 6. Subsection (3) of section 101.694, Florida 29 Statutes, is amended to read: 30 101.694 Mailing of ballots upon receipt of federal 31 postcard application.--10

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1 (3) There shall be printed across the face of each 2 envelope in which a ballot is sent to a federal postcard 3 applicant, or is returned by such applicant to the supervisor, 4 two parallel horizontal red bars, each one-quarter inch wide, 5 extending from one side of the envelope to the other side, б with an intervening space of one-quarter inch, the top bar to 7 be 1 1/4 inches from the top of the envelope, and with the words "Official Election Balloting Material-via Air Mail," or 8 9 similar language, between the bars. There shall be printed in 10 the upper right corner of each such envelope, in a box, the 11 words "Free of U. S. Postage, including Air Mail." All printing on the face of each envelope shall be in red, and 12 There shall be printed in red in the upper left corner of each 13 14 ballot envelope an appropriate inscription or blanks for return address of sender. Additional specifications may be 15 prescribed by rule of the Division of Elections upon 16 17 recommendation of the presidential designee under the 18 Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act. 19 Otherwise, the envelopes shall be the same as those used in 20 sending ballots to, or receiving them from, other absentee 21 voters. 22 Section 7. Section 104.047, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 23 24 104.047 Absentee voting .--25 (1) Any person who provides or offers to provide, and any person who accepts, a pecuniary or other benefit in 26 27 exchange for distributing, ordering, requesting, collecting, 28 delivering, or otherwise physically possessing absentee 29 ballots, except as provided in ss. 101.6105-101.694, is guilty of a felony of the third degree, punishable as provided in s. 30 31 775.082, s. 775.083, or s. 775.084. 11

1	(2) Except as provided in s. 101.62 or s. 101.655, any
2	person who requests an absentee ballot on behalf of an elector
3	is guilty of a felony of the third degree, punishable as
4	provided in s. 775.082, s. 775.083, or s. 775.084.
5	(3) Any person, other than a notary or other officer
6	entitled to administer oaths or an absentee ballot coordinator
7	as provided by s. 101.685, who witnesses more than five
8	ballots in any single election, is guilty of a misdemeanor of
9	the first degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082 or s.

11	(3) (4) Any person who marks or designates a choice on
12	the ballot of another person, except as provided in s.
13	101.051, s. 101.655, or s. 101.661, is guilty of a felony of
14	the third degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, s.

16	(4)(5) Any person who returns more than two absentee
17	ballots to the supervisors of elections in violation of s.
18	101.647 is guilty of a misdemeanor of the first degree,
19	punishable as provided in s. 775.082 or s. 775.083.

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1	STATEMENT OF SUBSTANTIAL CHANGES CONTAINED IN COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR
2	<u>SB 334</u>
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4	Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 334 deletes a requirement
5	that absentee ballot witnesses include their "Country" on the Voter's Certificate; deletes a requirement that absentee voters and witnesses include their printed name on the Voter's Certificate; repeals the provision of law authorizing political parties to appoint absentee ballot coordinators;
б	Certificate; repeals the provision of law authorizing political parties to appoint absentee ballot coordinators;
7	deletes a newly-created felony offense for "witnessing" absentee ballots for compensation; and, modifies the effective
8	date.
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
