The bill would amend the disqualification provision for voluntarily leaving work by adding to the meaning of "good cause" the condition of being a victim of domestic violence which results in separation from work.

The bill provides an effective date of July 1, 2000.

The bill does not address the issue of rulemaking.

The Revenue Estimating Conference has yet to address this bill.

B. PRESENT SITUATION:

Section 443.101(1)(a)1., Florida Statutes, provides that an individual who has voluntarily quit employment is subject to disqualification from receiving unemployment compensation benefits for the full period of unemployment next ensuing after he or she has left work and until such individual has earned income equal to at least 17 times the weekly benefit amount of the claim. However, if the individual leaves work with "good cause," he or she is not subject to disqualification. The term "good cause" is defined as cause attributable to the employing unit or which consists of illness or disability of the individual requiring separation from his or her work.

C. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

The bill would amend s. 443.101(1)(a)1., F.S., allowing victimization through domestic violence as a condition of "good cause" for separtion from employment.
