I. Summary:

This bill reinforces existing law regarding a parent's rights to access a child's records and other pertinent information.

This bill substantially amends the following section of the Florida Statutes: 61.13

II. Present Situation:

Parental Access to Education and Medical Records

Section 61.13, F.S., governs child custody, support, and visitation. Specifically, section 61.13(2), F.S., sets forth the powers of the court in all child custody matters, including parental responsibility. Florida law contemplates that both parents, regardless of marital status and custodial designation, shall continue to have full "[a]ccess to all records and information pertaining to a minor child, including, but not limited to, medical, dental, and school records." s. 61.13(2)(b)3., F.S.

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

Section 1 amends s. 61.13(2), F.S., relating to child custody, support, and visitation. It reinforces the existing statutory right of either parent to equally access all records and information (including, but not limited to, medical, dental, and school records) pertaining to the minor child. Unless a court order is entered specifically revoking a secondary residential (non-custodial) parent's rights to these records or information, he or she has the same full rights as the primary residential (custodial) parent, including the right to direct communication with the medical, dental and educational providers.

Section 2 provides that the Act shall take effect July 1, 2000.
