Teacher recruitment and retention; 22 financial incentives .--23 (1) The Department of Education shall award a tuition 24 reimbursement in the amount of \$5,000 after the 3rd and 5th 25 years of employment in a Florida public school to those 26 instructional personnel hired after July 1, 1999, who have not 27 been employed by a district school board during the 5-year 28 period preceding such employment. 29 (2) The Department of Education shall award financial

bonuses to instructional personnel according to the following

- (a) At the end of the 10th year of teaching in a Florida public school, a bonus of 7 percent of that employee's base salary for the previous year.
- (b) At the end of the 15th, 20th, 25th, and 30th years of teaching in a Florida public school, bonuses of 10 percent of the employee's base salary for the previous year.
- (3) Financial incentives awarded pursuant to this act shall not be included in any calculation of retirement benefits.
- (4) The Legislature shall annually appropriate to the Department of Education in the General Appropriations Act, based upon the legislative budget request of the department, an amount sufficient to carry out the provisions of this act.
- Section 2. Paragraph (c) of subsection (1) and paragraph (a) of subsection (3) of section 231.173, Florida Statutes, are amended to read:
- 231.173 Successful experienced out-of-state teachers and administrators. --
- (1) Notwithstanding the provisions of ss. 231.02, 231.15, and 231.17 or any other provision of law or rule to the contrary, a successful, experienced, out-of-state teacher or administrator qualifies for a professional certificate if the applicant:
- (c) Documents 2 5 years of appropriate successful full-time teaching or administrative experience in another state, including 2 continuous years during the 10-year 5-year period immediately preceding the date of application for certification.
- (3) The professional certificate issued in accordance with subsection (1) shall reflect specialization coverages as 31 follows:

Teachers. -- An applicant shall be eligible for specialization the academic coverage in an area in which the teacher is assigned to teach in a public school or nonpublic school in this state or in the area or areas of specialization of the applicant's certification by the National Board of Professional Teaching Standards, or in which the applicant demonstrates professional competence according to the provisions of ss. 231.15(1) and 231.17(7). Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2000. HOUSE SUMMARY Requires the Department of Education to award funds to certain instructional personnel for tuition reimbursement and salary bonuses. Prohibits funds awarded pursuant to this act from being included in calculations of retirement benefits. Requires an appropriation.
