Developmental pediatrics. 9 10 2. Nutrition. 11 Children's vision. 12 Children's hearing. 4. 13 Environmental health and allergies. Family medicine. 14 6. 15 7. Emerging literacy. 16 The Governor shall appoint the parent, the teacher, and the 17 18 member with expertise in developmental pediatrics. The President of the Senate shall appoint the members with 19 expertise in nutrition, children's vision, and children's 20 hearing. The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall 21 22 appoint the members with expertise in environmental health and allergies, family medicine, and emerging literacy. 23 24 The steering committee shall work collaboratively with the University of South Florida, the University of 25 Central Florida, and Florida Atlantic University to make the 26 27 Learning Gateway Project an innovative project based on state-of-the-art research. Each participating university shall 28 29 contribute the time, research, and knowledge of its top

faculty and students in the relevant fields of expertise.

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the guidance of the steering committee and shall consist of Learning Gateway Centers centrally located at convenient and easily accessible sites in each of the pilot counties. The project shall:

- (a) Use the expertise, resources, faculty, and students within the participating universities to contribute to the project. As directed by the steering committee of the Learning Gateway Project, the participating universities may use their students to design brochures, perform research, collect data on community resources and programs, and develop and maintain a website to give parents and families, school readiness and child care personnel, teachers, and health care practitioners throughout each of the pilot counties information about early warning signs of learning disabilities, as well as information about Learning Gateway Centers and community-based programs.
- (b) Work collaboratively with local agencies and public and private health and childhood programs to develop a comprehensive list of medical and nonmedical providers of learning disabilities services for young children within each of the pilot counties.
- (c) Identify the factors that interfere with or inhibit normal development and learning. The Learning Gateway Project shall bring together research that integrates the disciplines relevant to the diagnosis, causes, treatment, and intervention of early learning disabilities.
- (d) Provide physicians, health care personnel, school readiness and child care personnel, and school personnel throughout each of the pilot counties with medical and nonmedical intervention strategies that help identify such factors as diet, noise, environmental contaminants, and

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allergies which inhibit learning. Such information shall be prepared so that it can be appropriately presented as part of routine clinic sessions for immunization visits and visits under the "Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children" (WIC) under s. 383.011 and other well-child appointments.

- (e) Identify the elements of an effective research-based curriculum for each learning disability.
- (f) Develop a model system of care, through the establishment of the county Learning Gateway Centers, that builds upon, integrates, and identifies the gaps in existing learning disabilities services for young children.
- (g) Develop two brochures and a website to distribute information throughout each of the pilot counties.
- 1. One brochure shall be designed to educate parents and families about the importance of prenatal care and nutrition and reading and communicating with the child, and shall identify the early warning signs of disabilities that may lead to learning disabilities and developmental delays. This brochure shall be distributed to parents through all of the pilot county's early childhood programs, including but not limited to programs administered by the local school readiness coalitions, county public health units, healthy start coalitions, and workforce centers.
- 2. One brochure shall be developed to provide physicians, parents, school readiness and child care personnel, and teachers information on the Learning Gateway Project and the Learning Gateway Centers, as well as all the programs, facilities, resources, and services available within each pilot county to address learning disabilities in young

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The website shall provide ready access for parents,
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    physicians and other health care personnel, school readiness
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    and child care personnel, and teachers, throughout the pilot
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    counties, to information regarding the Learning Gateway
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    Project and the Learning Gateway Centers for the purpose of
    referral and information on the learning disabilities
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    addressed by the project. It shall itemize the resources
    available for intervention, diagnosis, and treatment, as well
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    as county listings of available related services and
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    providers, indexed by learning disability.
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          (3)(a) The Learning Gateway Centers shall develop a
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   network of all available services to address learning
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    disabilities in young children within each pilot county and
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    submit the list and description to the Learning Gateway
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    Project for inclusion in the website. The Learning Gateway
    Centers shall use the list to refer parents to programs or
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    facilities appropriate to meet their child's needs. For the
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    purpose of serving areas of the pilot counties where no
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    services currently exist or where the private providers lack
    the expertise to diagnose and provide strategies for improved
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    learning, each Learning Gateway Center may use Learning
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    Gateway Project funds to set up clinics to diagnose learning
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    disabilities. The Learning Gateway Centers may provide
