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- 1 Any A facility which admits or advertises that it provides special care to an individual for persons with 2 3 Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders must meet the following standards of operation: 4 5
 - (a)1. If the facility has 17 or more residents, have an awake staff member on duty at all hours of the day and night; or
 - 2. If the facility has fewer than 17 residents, have an awake staff member on duty at all hours of the day and night or have mechanisms in place to monitor and ensure the safety of the facility's residents.
 - (b) Offer activities specifically designed for persons who are cognitively impaired.
 - (c) Have a physical environment that provides for the safety and welfare of the facility's residents.
 - Employ staff who have completed the training and continuing education required in subsections subsection (2) and (3).
 - (2)(a) An individual who is employed by a facility that provides special care for residents with Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders, and who has regular contact with such residents, must complete up to 4 hours of initial dementia-specific training developed or approved by the department. The training shall be completed within 3 months after beginning employment and shall satisfy the core training requirements of s. 400.452(2)(g).
- (b) A direct caregiver who is employed by a facility that provides special care for residents with Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders, and who provides direct care to such residents, must complete the required initial 31 training and 4 additional hours of training developed or

approved by the department. The training shall be completed within 9 months after beginning employment and shall satisfy the core training requirements of s. 400.452(2)(g).

- (c) An individual who is employed by a facility that provides special care for residents with Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders, but who only has incidental contact with such residents, must be given, at a minimum, general information on interacting with individuals with Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders, within 3 months after beginning employment.
- (3) In addition to the training required under subsection (2), a direct caregiver must complete up to participate in a minimum of 4 contact hours of dementia-specific continuing education each calendar year as approved by the department. The continuing education must include one or more topics included in the dementia-specific training developed or approved by the department, in which the caregiver has not received previous training.
- (4) Upon completing any training listed in subsection (2), the employee or direct caregiver shall be issued a certificate that includes the name of the training provider, the topic covered, and the date and signature of the training provider. 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                               STATEMENT OF SUBSTANTIAL CHANGES CONTAINED IN COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR Senate Bill 1456
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         The Committee Substitute for SB 1456 modifies training requirements for all the provider types in the bill, requiring 4 hours of initial dementia-specific training; and "up to" 4 hours of continuing education; removes a section pertaining to fees that the department may charge for the training; establishes a work group at the Department of Elderly Affairs to develop the training guidelines; requires that a community-care services system must contain a dementia-specific care provider network.
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
