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1 (c) To provide consistent education policy vertically 2 and horizontally across all educational delivery systems, 3 focusing on students the needs of those receiving education, 4 not those providing education. (d) To provide substantially improved vertical and 5 6 horizontal articulation across all educational delivery 7 systems while ensuring that nonpublic education institutions 8 and home education programs maintain their independence, 9 autonomy, and nongovernmental status. 10 (e) To provide for devolution of authority to the schools, community colleges, universities, and other education 11 12 institutions that are the actual deliverers of educational services in order to provide student-centered education 13 services within the clear parameters of the overarching 14 15 education policy established by the Legislature. 16 (2) The guiding principles for Florida's new education 17 governance are: (a) A coordinated, seamless system for kindergarten 18 through graduate school education. 19 20 (b) A system that is student-centered in every facet. 21 (c) A system that maximizes education access and 22 provides the opportunity for a high-quality education academic success for all Floridians. 23 24 (d) A system that safeguards equity and supports 25 academic excellence. (e) A system that provides for local operational 26 27 flexibility while promoting accountability for student 28 achievement and improvement refuses to compromise academic 29 excellence. 30 Section 3. 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229.003 Florida education governance reorganization.--1 2 (1) Effective January 7, 2003, The Florida Board of 3 Education, created pursuant to s. 229.004, shall be 4 responsible for overseeing kindergarten through graduate 5 school education, in accordance with the implementation 6 process in s. 229.0072 and the policies and guiding principles 7 in s. 229.002 and the mission and goals of s. 229.007. 8 (2) Effective January 7, 2003, the Florida Board of 9 Education shall appoint the Commissioner of Education. 10 (2)(3) Effective January 7, 2003, There are is 11 established the following education governance officers in 12 addition to the Commissioner of Education: 13 A Chancellor of Public Schools, K-12 Education (a) appointed by the Commissioner of Education. 14 15 (b) A Chancellor of Colleges and State Universities, appointed by the Commissioner of Education. 16 17 (c) A Chancellor of Community Colleges and Career Preparation, appointed by the Commissioner of Education. 18 (d) An Executive Director of Independent Nonpublic and 19 Nontraditional Education, appointed by the Commissioner of 20 21 Education. 22 23 Each chancellor and executive director shall be subject to 24 confirmation by the Florida Board of Education and shall serve 25 at the pleasure and under the authority of the Commissioner of 26 Education. 27 (3)(4) Effective July 1, 2000, The Governor shall 28 appoint a seven-member board of trustees for the Florida 29 Virtual On-Line High School, which shall be a body corporate 30 with all the powers of a body corporate. 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appoint for each university in the State University System, an 1 2 11-member a nine-member board of trustees, which shall be a 3 body corporate with all the powers of a body corporate. (2) The center shall operate under the guidance of an 9 10 independent nine-member advisory council and the guiding principles of s. 229.002. 11 12 (3) The advisory council shall be composed of five members appointed by the Governor, two members appointed by 13 the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and two members 14 15 appointed by the President of the Senate. The executive 5 director shall have broad knowledge and experience in б 7 educational accountability, governance, policy, research, and practice. The executive director shall be appointed by the 8 Governor and confirmed by the Florida Board of Education, and 9 10 shall serve at the pleasure of the advisory council. The executive director shall staff the meetings of the advisory 11 12 council and shall document and communicate the findings and recommendations of the advisory council. The executive 13 director shall report to the Florida Board of Education on at 14 15 least a quarterly basis to inform the board of the center's findings. 16 17 (5) The center shall be staffed and funded as provided 18 for in the General Appropriations Act.
