The hospice must give a copy of all such advertisements or a copy of the document to each person who requests information about programs and services for persons with Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders offered by the hospice and must maintain a copy of all such advertisements and documents in its records. The agency shall examine all such advertisements and documents in the hospice's records as part of the license renewal procedure.
- (2) A hospice licensed under this part must provide to each of its employees, upon beginning employment, basic written information about interacting with persons with Alzheimer's disease or a related disorder.

Section 150. An employee hired on or after July 1, 2001, need not comply with the guidelines created in sections 145-149 of this act before July 1, 2002.

Section 151. The Department of Elderly Affairs may contract with or enter into a cooperative agreement with a state university or statewide advocacy organization that possesses expertise in the area of Alzheimer's disease and related disorders to review potential trainers and training materials. The department may accept grants, donations, and gifts to meet the costs associated with providing the review
