1 A bill to be entitled  
 2 An act relating to the placement of rip current  
 3 warning signs; creating s. 380.275, F.S.;  
 4 providing for a cooperative effort among state  
 5 agencies and local governments to plan for and  
 6 assist in the placement of rip current warning  
 7 signs; providing that the Department of  
 8 Community Affairs shall direct and coordinate  
 9 the program; requiring the development of a  
 10 uniform rip current warning sign; authorizing  
 11 the department to coordinate the location,  
 12 distribution, and erection of rip current  
 13 warning signs; providing for rules; limiting  
 14 the liability of participating governmental  
 15 entities; providing for the responsibilities of  
 16 governmental entities; providing an effective  
 17 date.

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 19 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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 21 Section 1. Section 380.275, Florida Statutes, is  
 22 created to read:

23 380.275 Beaches and coastal areas; posting of rip  
 24 current warning signs.--

25 (1) It is the intent of the Legislature that a  
 26 cooperative effort among state agencies and local governments  
 27 be developed to plan for and assist in the placement of rip  
 28 current warning signs along the public beaches and coastal  
 29 areas of the state. A rip current is a strong surface current  
 30 of water flowing out past the surf zone which can pull even  
 31 the strongest swimmer into deeper water. Rip currents pose a

1 significant danger of drowning to tourists and the public, and  
2 it is therefore important to warn the public to be cautious in  
3 coastal areas where rip currents can occur.

4 (2) The Department of Community Affairs, through the  
5 Florida Coastal Management Program, shall direct and  
6 coordinate the rip current warning sign program, which shall  
7 be a program to require the placement of rip current warning  
8 signs in areas that pose a significant risk to the public as a  
9 result of rip currents. Signs shall be located where the  
10 local government entity has established an access way to a  
11 beach or coastal area.

12 (3) The department shall develop a uniform rip current  
13 warning sign for use at any public beach or along any coastal  
14 area where there may be a significant threat to the public as  
15 a result of rip currents, to be placed, insofar as is  
16 practicable, wherever the local government entity has  
17 established access ways to the beach.

18 (4) The department shall, within the limits of  
19 appropriations available to it for such purposes, establish  
20 and operate a program to fund the placement of rip current  
21 warning signs in areas where the local government entity has  
22 established an access way to a beach or coastal area that may  
23 be subject to a significant threat of dangerous rip currents  
24 and therefore may pose a hazard to the public. The department  
25 shall coordinate efforts to determine the locations that local  
26 governments consider appropriate for placement of rip current  
27 warning signs. For these locations, the department shall make  
28 rip current warning signs available to the governing body of  
29 any county or municipality in such quantity as is determined  
30 by the department. The department shall also coordinate with  
31 the local governing body the distribution and erection of rip

1 current warning signs, wherever there is a request for such  
2 assistance.

3 (5) The department may adopt such rules and forms as  
4 are necessary to carry out the purposes of this section and to  
5 ensure that all projects to which assistance is rendered under  
6 this section are for the purpose of providing and erecting rip  
7 current warning signs.

8 (6) The state, state agencies, local governments, and  
9 local government agencies shall not be held liable for any  
10 injury caused by the placement or maintenance of rip current  
11 warning signs or the failure to install or maintain rip  
12 current signs as provided by this section.

13 (7) This section is not intended to relieve a  
14 governmental entity of any responsibility imposed by other  
15 provisions of law with regard to the posting of rip current  
16 warning signs other than those covered by this section.

17 Section 2. This act shall take effect October 1, 2001.

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19 SENATE SUMMARY

20 Provides for a cooperative effort among state agencies  
21 and local governments to plan for and assist in the  
22 placement of rip current warning signs, under the  
23 direction of the Department of Community Affairs.  
24 Requires the development of a uniform rip current warning  
25 sign and authorizes the department to coordinate the  
26 location, distribution, and erection of such signs.  
27 Limits the liability of participating governmental  
28 entities.  
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
